# Climate Action Tullamore Decarbonising Zone (TDZ)

The series of CARO nationwide workshops aimed at Decarbonising Zone (DZ) activation continued in



October with events held in Mullingar (Community Activation), Roscommon (Natural Environmental Opportunities) and finally Thurles (Bioeconomy). Bioeconomy workshop was delivered in conjunction with Bioeconomy Ireland and Climate -KIC and formed part of the Bioeconomy Ireland Week 14<sup>th</sup>-20<sup>th</sup> October. The workshop commenced with a site visit to the new National Bioeconomy Campus (former Lisheen Mine) where participants got to discuss the challenges and opportunities of the Bioeconomy with the DZ.

#### **Energy**



The Midlands Energy Agency (MEA) organized a 'Fleet Decarbonization' session which was well attended by fleet managers and those responsible for energy across the five midlands counties. The session was facilitated on behalf of SEAI by Mr. Conor Molloy who is the leading industry expert in the area of fleet and transport energy audits in Ireland. A second session is scheduled for Directors of Service responsible for fleet/energy management.

Tullamore welcomed the CCMA national Energy Performance Officer (EPO) workshop which saw EPO's from all the local authorities across the country come together to discuss national and European policy development around energy while sharing challenges and experiences with regards to measures taken towards current national energy targets.

Offaly County Council, joined nine other public bodies in continuing along the process of preparing for ISO 50,001 Energy Management certification by attending days 8 & 9 of the SEAI Accelerator Programme masterclasses. Much hard work has been expended in order to get the Council's structures, operations and controls in line with accreditation audit requirements ahead of a third party accreditation in 2025.



# Environment Water Quality Farm Inspections

Targeted farm inspections are commencing in accordance with the Good Agricultural Practice Regulations, SI 113 and 393 (Good Agricultural Practice for the Protection of Waters) Regulations 2022 as amended. i.e. The Nitrates Regulations.

Members of the Water Quality Team have completed 90 no. farm inspections as part of the National Agricultural Inspection Programme (NAIP) 2024.

### Domestic Wastewater Treatment Systems (DWWTS) inspections

The Water Quality Team have completed 39 no. Domestic Wastewater Treatment System (DWWTS) inspections as part of the National Inspection Plan for Domestic Wastewater Treatment Systems 2024.

#### **Waste Management**

- Derryclure Landfill- Works are ongoing in Derryclure to meet aftercare compliance requirements stipulated by the EPA.
- There have been four Construction and Demolition illegal sites investigated, these are on-going and brought to completion by the end of the year.
- The Farm Hazardous Waste Collection initiative organised in conjunction with the IFFPG took place at J Grennan and Sons, Tinnycross, Tullamore on the 6<sup>th</sup> of November.
- Tender Documents are prepared for the Historical landfills for groundworks worth €100,000.
   Tender will be published shortly to the contractors on an existing framework.
- Waste Facility Permit Annual Contributions for 2022 and 2023 was issued in October.

 Training was organised with CCTV Contractor for Offaly County Council with the view of installing CCTV in dumping blackspots to prevent dumping following the introduction of new guidance on Data Protection and usage of CCTV.

#### **RMCEI**

The third quarter review of RMCEI was completed following submission of planned inspections numbers to EPA. the assessment of the progress was reviewed against the targets in Offaly County Councils RMCEI Plan for 2024.

#### **Environmental Awareness**

Offaly County Council is working with the Rediscovery Centre in Ballymun in Dublin on a national project in secondary schools. The topic ReLove Fashion where students are encouraged to design and submit projects to raise awareness on the issue of Fast Fashion. There are 14 projects submitted from Offaly schools, Banagher Youth Group, LOETB and one library. Schools are:

# **Burial Grounds St. Mary's Cemetery, Edenderry**

We are finalising the main works and the finishing touches to the extension with the contractor. The extension will provide an extra 300 burial spaces in the cemetery. Finalisation and landscaping will take place over the coming months.



#### **Cemetery Committees**

We currently work with 19 cemetery committees, two new committees were formed in 2024, and we look forward to working with them too. We are currently processing our cemetery committee



grants, which should be dispersed by the end of the year. There are grants and assistance available form the CA-ENV-RW section and we welcome engagement from groups that are currently maintaining their local cemetery or planning on forming a committee to do that.

#### **RURAL WATER SERVICES**



#### Capital

Applications for capital funding for from the Multi-Annual Rural Water Programme 2024 to 2026 were submitted to the Rural Water Unit, Dept of Housing, in April, and all projects have been reviewed and passed stage 1 of the application process. Stage 2 of the application process involves consideration by the RWU's Expert Panel for consideration. The Rural Water Unit have recently announced their decision on a portion of the grants and we are advising the Group Water Schemes of that decision.

#### Subsidy

We have completed the payment of annual and advance subsidies to the Group Water Schemes. We have paid a total of €1,069,594.00 in subsidy support to 15 group water schemes.

#### Veterinary Control of Dogs

So far this year we have cared for over 180 dogs in the dog shelter and on average 15% of the dogs are reclaimed by their owners, 15% are rehomed by the Care of Dogs Team and the other 70% are rehomed through animal rescue charities.

The Control of Dogs team has also dealt with 76 complaints so far this year and has assisted AGS in a number of instances. The team have carried out inspections of premises under DBE and Animal Health and Welfare legislation and successfully prosecuted an operator for a breach of DBE regulations.

#### **Control of Horses**

To date in 2024, we have dealt with 15 complaints, there have been no seizures to date.

#### **Veterinary Inspections**

Offaly County Council continues to operate the Shared Service Agreement for Veterinary Services in the Westmeath County Council administrative area.

#### **TRANSPORTATION**

#### **2024** Winter Service Plan

The 2024 Winter Maintenance Program commenced on the 14<sup>th</sup> of October and will run up to the end of April 2025.

#### **2024 Annual Roads Program**

Works across all Municipal Districts under the 2024 Annual Roads Program are now substantially completed. The 2024 program included the completion of the Grand Canal Greenway. The official opening of the completed 70km of mainline section occurred on the 10th of October 2024 and was presided over by Minister of State Mr. James Lawless TD.

- Submission of Clara Western Relief Road to the Department of Transport for funding

- under the Strategic Regional and Local Roads Program for 2025
- Implementation of new Default Speed Limits for all Local Roads. The implementation date has now been deferred to the 7<sup>th</sup> of February 2025.

#### **Public Lighting**

The following is a breakdown of the Public Lighting failures across the County. There are **196** faults on the system presently. **31** of these faults require third party intervention and as such cannot be repaired by the maintenance contractor. These anomalies are being addressed by the yearly public lighting capital program.

Therefore, the current actionable faults amount to **165** <u>faults or 1.77 %</u> of the lighting stock.

#### **Housing Update**

- There are 549 on the Social Housing Support List at the end of October 2024.
- A further 500 active tenancies are currently being supported under the Housing Assistance Payments (HAP) Scheme, 2 signed up for HAP and 7 exited from HAP in October.
- At the end of October 39 single people and 17 couples/families were being supported in emergency accommodation.
- The 2024 Rent Review of Social Leasing Scheme Tenants (Rental Accommodation, Short Term Leasing, Repair & Lease and Mortgage to Rent) and HAP Tenants is complete. Approx 662 rent letters were issued to Social Leasing Scheme and HAP tenants on Friday 28<sup>th</sup> June 2024, these rents became effective from the 13<sup>th</sup> July 2024. #### **Retrofit Programme**

In deciding on a works programme, local authorities are urged to choose a mix of properties across a range of BERs to allow for homes which need significant expenditure to be balanced out by those needing lesser spend so as to achieve the overall average cost of €34,000 per property. A BER rating of B2 must be achieved.

#### **Community Development Programme**

- Estate Management Funding for Birr, Edenderry and Tullamore Municipal Districts have been agreed at Municipal District meetings.

- Housing Staff delivered a total of 10 sessions of games on the green in 7 LA estates during the Summer months to encourage children to participate in their local communities. This initiative has been delivered in partnership with Offaly Sports Partnership and the housing section for a 4th year for children between the ages of 6 and 12. Over the 10 sessions a total of 80 children attended the games and there was a great mix of age ranges from 6 to 12 and a good balance of boys and girls attending the sessions.

## Just Transition - Local Economic and Community Plans Scheme

Earlier in 2024, Offaly County Council successfully secured the sum of €253k to fund a dedicated resource for the FilmOffaly office. Competitve interviews were held in August 2024 with the successful applicant

commencing on 7<sup>th</sup> October 2024, under the mangement of the Council's Arts Officer. This development resource will be tasked with developing and implemeting a three-year FilmOffaly Strategic Development Plan, managing the day-to-day running of the film office, while also promoting Offaly as a film location.



### Strategic Partnership Scheme with Failte Ireland

In June 2024, Failte Ireland announced funding to Offaly County Council in the sum of €218k, to fund the planning and design of a 'plaza' / public amenity area off the Main Street in Shannonbridge which will lead down to the Shannon Callows, and the planned Dublin − Galway Greenway, together with the feasibility planning and design of a floating walkway over the Callows. This project will also seek to locate the plaza area and any potential for parking thereon, within the wider context of parking requirements within the village itself. Tender documents are currently being prepared in order to engage a consultant in early 2025 to undertake this project.

Funding was also secured in the sum of €188k for the provision of high-quality granite pedestrian paving to improve access to Birr Castle Demesne along its boundary at William Street. It is estimated that these works will commence in early 2025.

#### Town Centre First Ferbane Town Centre First Plan

On Tuesday, October 22nd, Offaly County Council, Ferbane Town Team, and Technological University of the Shannon (TUS) hosted an information gathering workshop at Gallen Community School in Ferbane. The event saw an excellent turnout, featuring highly interactive and productive sessions that yielded valuable feedback on the town of Ferbane.

Dr Shane O'Sullivan, Technological University of the Shannon, presented the main statistics of the town of Ferbane, which were based on the results of the 2016 and 2022 census as well as outlining how Ferbane compared nationally. The community participants then identified and discussed the towns strengths and opportunities as well as the challenges it faces; business and services currently serving the town as well as other ideas to make Ferbane a more vibrant place to live, work and visit.

All this information will feed into the Town Centre First Plan which is currently being developed by the Town Team in Ferbane. The plan will guide the regeneration of Ferbane, build on the positive initiatives taking place and set a new vision for the town's future by identifying key projects for development.

#### **Ferbane Walkability Audit**

Offaly County Council conducted a Walkability Audit of Ferbane's town centre on the morning of the 22<sup>nd</sup> October. The purpose of the audit was to examine how accessible the main pedestrian routes are for people of mixed ages and abilities with both positive and negative aspects identified. The routes incorporated the main services such as shops and businesses, schools, church, health centre, sporting facilities etc.



20 local community representatives were invited to participate in the audit and were supported by technical and administrative staff from Offaly County Council and by An Garda Síochána. A debriefing session was held in the Heritage Centre at the



end of the audit at which the group

discussed their findings. A report on the audit will be compiled in the coming weeks by the regeneration section and used for the Town Centre Plan first phase "understanding Ferbane"

Funding under Measure 1 – Town Team Support Fund – Kilmalogue and Daingean

Earlier this year Kilmalogue and Daingean were awarded €10,000 each by the Department of Rural and Community Development under **Measure 1** - **Town Team Support Fund**. These funds will be used to complete health checks in Kilmalogue & Daingean. All the information gathered during the health check will be the foundation for the future Town Centre First Plans for Kilmalogue and Daingean.

On October 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> Offaly County Council and Technological University of the Shannon (TUS) hosted an information gathering workshop at Daingean Town Hall and Coláiste Iosagáin, Kilmalogue. The events were both very well attended and featured engaging productive sessions that produced valuable feedback on both towns.

Offaly PPN staff were facilitators at the Comhairle Na nÓg AGM. It was a great event and offered us an opportunity to introduce the PPN at the tables we facilitated to the young people. This also gives an insight in the key areas of interest among young people and the key priorities that want to focus on for the year ahead.

Offaly PPN presented the Funding Opportunities report at the October LCDC meeting. The National PPN Conference was held in the Strand Hotel Limerick on Oct 17<sup>th</sup> & 18<sup>th</sup>. Offaly was well represented with PPN staff Bridie & Carol in attendance along with Johnny Dunne and Seamus Rourke from the Secretariat

and Community Staff - Acting SEO Lourda Giles and AO Brian Pey.

Limerick PPN hosted the event in conjunction with Limerick County Council. The Conference was opened by the Mayor of Limerick followed by workshops and discussion on the PPN on its 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary.

Four PPN's presented and facilitated Workshops on the Friday morning including:

- Cavan PPN: Wellbeing of Staff & Volunteers in PPN's
- Tipperary PPN: Climate Coaches Programme
- Limerick PPN UL Citizens Assembly
- Offaly PPN: Community Energy Charter

Rebekah Keaveny and Bridie Costello Hynes presented on the Community Energy Charter The Community Energy Charter was well received with interest from a number of PPN's.







Offaly PPN are currently organising the PPN Plenary which will take place on 14<sup>th</sup> November in the Tullamore Court @7.00pm. Guest Speakers: Ombudsman Ger Deering followed by an update on the Community Energy Charter. There will also be Organisations/ Groups with Information stands on the evening too.





The Annual Offaly Comhairle na nÓg Youth Conference was held on October 8<sup>th</sup> in Mucklagh Community Centre. The event was attended by over 100 Young people representing all Second level Schools throughout the County. Guest Speaker, Jordan Conroy member of the National Rugby Sevens team, addressed the room with an inspiring talk on Mental Health. Cathaoirleach Tony McCormack spoke on the importance of the Youth Voice in Local decision and policy making.

Two Workshops were held which all attendees participated in. These were

facilitated by members of the CNN steering committee representing a number of Agencies and sectors: CAMHS HSE, An Garda Síochana, Offaly Libraries, PPN, Jigsaw, Offaly County Council and OLDC Staff. The young people identified and discussed the issues that are most important to them. A vote at the end of the workshops saw Mental Health voted as the topic that young people would like CNN to continue focus on in 2025.







As a follow on from the Youth Conference new members were invited to join, they completed expressions of interest forms. The Comhairle Coordinator will follow up with these in November. The day was a great success and ended with a dance off!

#### **Age Friendly Programme**

Among the key Age Friendly actions being progressed in 2024 is the plan to make Tullamore train station an Age Friendly Train Station in accordance with the recognised WHO process. A walkability audit was completed on 11<sup>th</sup> October 2024 attended by members of Offaly Older Persons Council, Offaly Age Friendly Alliance, Offaly Disability and Equality Network, and by staff from larnród Eireann, AFI and Offaly County Council. The audit was carried out in the context of the National Sustainable



Age Friendly Audit of Tullamore Train station on 11<sup>th</sup> October 2024

Mobility policy which sets out to progressively make public transport systems more accessible for people with disabilities, people with reduced mobility and older people, using an integrated universal design approach. The walkability audit survey and checklist were developed with reference to the World Health organisation's Guidelines for Age Friendly Environments and the National Transport Authority's Universal Design Walkability Audit Tool.

The audit is designed to assess accessibility and user experience. The route started at the car park outside the station, the ticket offices, platforms, and followed the public footpath up the hill to the traffic lights and pedestrian crossing. There were 24 participants in all, including a wheelchair user, a person with reduced mobility and a person with visual impairment.

After the walkability audit, participants held a meeting to discuss and record their observations and findings in relation to improvements which need to be implemented at the station and surrounding access points. Improvements and additions to be considered include upgrading of signage and information provided, staff training, tactile paving, disability and age friendly car parking spaces and improved access to toilet facilities.

The issues identified will be addressed over the coming months by a dedicated steering group who will oversee implementation of the recommendations.



### The 2025 Youth Arts Commissions

The Youth Arts Commissions enables artists to work with

youth groups and communities to develop projects that will enable engagement between professional artists and young

people (13+), facilitated by youth organisations, youth leaders and schools. The goal being to build secure relationships with relevant partners for the development of Youth Arts in the county. The voice of



the young people is a priority for this programme. The 2025 call is currently being developed and will be available for artists, youth groups and organisations to apply before the end of 2024.

# FilmOffaly FilmOffaly Resource Development Project

Darren Lee joined the Arts Office in early October in the two-year fixed term post of Film Officer. This is a temporary post to deliver a project co-funded by the Government of Ireland and the European Union through the EU Just Transition Fund Programme 2021-2027. Darren is currently familiarising himself with FilmOffaly's activity so far, and working to refresh our systems, and rejuvenate the brand as well as beginning to outline future strategy for this project.



#### FilmOffaly Award 2023

In addition to the screening at OFFline. A Simple Killing has been receiving some festival attention. It recently had its US Premiere at the Newport Beach Film

Festival. The film was also shown at Westival in Westport, where it was screened as part of a programme of Western Front Studio's shorts, followed by a Q&A. with the producers.

#### FilmOffaly Award 2024

Pre-production for The Cure, the winner of the 2024 is progressing well and filming is planned around 12th and 13th November, most locations have been found with a final recce planed shortly. The production will be based in and around the Banagher Area and is expected to use local extras and Production Assistants/Runners.

#### **OFFline Film Festival**

The OFFline Film Festival took place in Early October. The Film Offaly 2023 winner, A Simple Killing formed part of the Made In Midlands screenings, followed by a Q&A with local filmmakers. The Arts Office's commissioned Mini Movies were also a great success with students of St Brendan's Boys School, Mercy Primary School and St Brendan's Community School, taking part and attending the screenings.

#### **Birr Writer's Residency Review**

In 2024 Offaly the Arts Office commissioned a review to examine the Arts Office supported, **Birr Writer's Residency** now in its tenth year. Birr Writer's Residency offers professional writers' accommodation and workspaces for six nights, at Brendan House in the centre of Birr, County Offaly. The purpose of the residency has been to provide an opportunity for artists to focus on a writing

project (current or new) in a tranquil environment which supports and values high professional artistic development. It is open to professional writers of any genre, e.g. literary fiction, poetry, playwrights, journalism or travel writing. The review will consider the potential growth of the residency going forward and will include a consultation process with stakeholders. Consultants Culture Works were awarded the commission following on open call and evaluation process. The review started in September and is currently ongoing due to be completed in 2025.

#### **Arts Newsletter**

The Arts Office continues to produce a bimonthly newsletter *Offaly Arts Alert,* offering updates and information on Arts Office event sand opportunities etc. as well as promoting and sharing funding and bursary opportunities that might be of interest to artists and communities that have a shared interest in the Arts. The Newsletter for Nov- December was disseminated at the end of Oct.

#### Social Media / Website

We continue to be very active on all our social media outlets and work to keep our website updated.

### **Collaborations Creative Places Edenderry**



Creative Places, Edenderry, a project funded by the Arts Council, led by Creative Lives in partnership with Offaly County Council Arts Office and Edenderry Municipal District was awarded a 4th year of funding by the Arts Council and goes from strength the strength hosting an array of different arts-based activities, workshops and events in a wide range of art forms including Visual Arts, Music, Poetry, Playwriting, Creative Movement; Dance: Ceramics: Drama; Radio, Photography.

Creative Places Edenderry is a community based project to connect, create and develop artistic and cultural activities to enhance the community engagement and spirit within Edenderry.

Activities are advertised on www.creativeplacesedenderry.ie The Creative Places Edenderry Facebook and Instagram Pages and include: The Monday Music Group, Visual Arts group for and by people who identify as disabled, ActiviTEA group and the Community Social. Creative Edenderry is also one of the programming and partners of the Hullabaloo Festival 2024, as well supporting partners to John Maguire and the Gemini Players with their upcoming production of 'The Witch Had it Coming! There will be other

events/training sessions, opportunities and meetings including

### Offaly County Council Municipal Collection Exhibition – Esker Arts

The Arts Office is currently working with Esker Arts to present *Saibhreas* an exhibition of works from Offaly County Council's municipal collection of visual art. Offaly County Council has been collecting art since the early 2000s and the collection now comprises over 500 works by local, national and international artists. The Collection includes painting, sculpture, drawing, photography, print and mixed-media works.

This will be the first time the Collection has been displayed in a purpose-build visual arts gallery and Esker Arts' Croghan Gallery will be the perfect setting for showing works, many of which have strong connections to County Offaly. The exhibition will run from 15<sup>th</sup> Nov until 20th December.

### INFRASTUCTURE PROJECTS Esker Arts

Esker Arts continued to be a hive of activity across the month of October with a range of workshops in a wide variety of artforms, as well as excellent local theatre. A sell out show for October was Roddy Doyle's *The Snapper* produced by Colin Hughes Promotions and a multimedia concert for all the family by The Whistleblast Quartet. Towards the end of the month Esker Arts were preparing for the Hullabaloo Children's Arts Festival for their younger audiences and the Eagla Fest 2024, with a line-up of bone-chilling films for the older audiences.

#### **Lough Boora Sculpture Park**

The Arts Office funded by Creative Ireland and supported by Bord na Móna have commissioned a new maintenance programme for Lough Boora Sculpture Park to take place through 2024-2025. Artist Michael Burke, Sculpture Works, has carried out a review and report and works having been taking place throughout the summer.

#### **Edenderry Library and Arts Base**

The Arts Office continues to work in close collaboration with the county librarian in the development of plans for a multipurpose Arts space and Artist's Studios to be incorporated into the planning of the new library for Edenderry including the audience and participant development as part of the Creative Places Edenderry project.



October 31<sup>st</sup> was the deadline for completion of year 2 of our Healthy Offaly funded actions. Financial and

progress reports have steadily been received from all implementing partners and will be entered into Pobal's online database of year end reporting.

Also, the post programme surveys which all implementing partners were required to fill out with their participants were sent to our programme evaluators, for analysis to determine the effectiveness of the interventions. These reports (one for each action) will be circulated to all relevant stakeholders when completed at year end.

In other news, Healthy Offaly was busy in October attending presentations on the 'Not Around Us' no smoking/No vaping campaigns in public spaces, Enabling Wellbeing Environments from Healthy Ireland Local Government office and the providing of some merchandise resources

for the FAI's 'Kick Fit' blitz for women over 40's. A huge part of the work of Healthy Offaly is attending these information and networking sessions to work with other agencies and partners in implementing the broader wellbeing agenda. Finally, the Healthy Offaly Coordinator contacted the Birr, Tullamore, Edenderry Municipal District offices this month with a view to requesting some time to present to the elected representatives and staff on progress of the roll out of Round 4 of the Healthy Ireland Fund. The Municipal Districts have included the Healthy Offaly Round 4 update on their November meeting agendas.

#### **SPORTS**

Programme highlights from October include: -



Ongoing delivery of the Sport 4 Empowerment programme funded by the European Social Fund+. Among the programmes delivered were recreational / social sport programmes with a focus on volleyball for 35 people; as well as the FITtS (Friendship, Integration and Teamwork through Sport) programme for 30+children in Banagher.

Two recreational / sport social programmes with a focus on volleyball were delivered. The first programme was delivered in Edenderry; and has resulted in the establishment of a new volleyball club in the town. The second programme is being delivered in Tullamore, and it is hoped that similar to Edenderry, a second volleyball club will also be established as a result of this initial six week programme. Participants on both programmes include international protection applicants and refugees.

The FITtS programme commenced in Banagher in October and is catering for 30+ children. Participants include international protection applicants, refugees and local children

Ongoing delivery of the ACE schools programme in eight schools. The six week programme will culminate in a week of "Fast Feet" regional competitions in November.

Ongoing delivery of programmes as part of the community sports and sports inclusion development programmes.

Among the programmes delivered as part of the community sports development programme were physical activity programmes for 45 adults and older adults including activator poles, pickleball and social walk leadership training; and community games athletics in Ferbane.

Ongoing delivery of programmes in each of our three sports hubs, Daingean, Mucklagh and Ballycumber.

Among the programmes delivered in the Daingean sports hub were physical activity programmes for 120 adults and older adults including exercise classes (chair yoga, Pilates, strength & conditioning); and the ACE schools programme in two schools within the catchment area of the sports hub.

Among the programmes delivered in the Mucklagh sports hub were physical activity programmes (Drop & Move, and activator poles) for 80 adults and older adults, adapted physical activity programmes for 15 people with additional needs, and after schools' programmes (basketball and Rinka fitness) for 90 children

Among the programmes delivered in the Ballycumber sports hub were physical activity programmes for 75 adults and older adults including exercise classes (boxercise, Pilates, strength & conditioning) racquet sports (badminton and pickleball), recreational / social darts and walking football.
