Appraisal: The modest form of this farmhouse is enhanced by the retention of many original features. Larger cut stone cill still in place, as well as larger timber window head. Cracks in external render show where larger opening once was. Internally the original width of timber frame is visible. Remove stone work surrounding current window to open up to original size. Have timber Wyatt window made to fill new opening, using existing sash window for the middle section. Make good the lime plaster internally and externally
