We are very pleased to present the Annual Report of Offaly Local Authorities for the year 2007. This report contains information about the services provided by the Council, its elected members, staff and departments.

We look forward to working with the elected members and staff of the Councils and the wider community in furthering the development of County Offaly at this time of both opportunity and challenge.

This was an eventful year for the Council as it seeks to deliver quality and cost effective services. The scale and diversity of the activities for the year reflect the ongoing development of Offaly as a vibrant and attractive county.

Midlands Gateway

Offaly's important location within the Midlands region coupled with Tullamore's designation as part of the ATM (Athlone, Tullamore, Mullingar) - Midlands Gateway means that the County has a pivotal role in the achievement of the development aspirations of the region. An application for funding was made to the Gateway Innovation Fund which would greatly assist Tullamore to develop its role in the Gateway and in County Offaly.

New National Costing Systems - Budget 2008

In late June 2007, the Department of Environment, Heritage and Local Government implemented a new costing system for local authorities. Better Local Government highlighted the need for a costing system which could produce service costs for the local Government Sector and this was further supported by the Indecon Report on the Financing of Local Government. The new costing system aims to provide transparency in the cost of services, particularly, in the area where there is a requirement to charge for services provided. It is being introduced for the County Council budget for 2008 and the Town Council budgets for 2009.

Planning & Economic Development/Gateway

Preparation of the Draft County Development Plan 2009-2015 is well advanced. It has been circulated to the elected members for their consideration. This plan is very important for the future development of the county particularly in the context of delivering a successful linked gateway in the Midlands region in conjunction with other key stakeholders, and using the opportunities presented by the Gateway to ensure balanced development across the county. This has been reflected in the Draft County Development Plan.

Capital Programme

In June 2007 a full report was brought to the elected members highlighting the Capital Expenditure Development Programme for the next three years. The report also included details of development contributions collected during the previous year and indicated future demands on development contribution income resulting from the Capital Expenditure Development Programme.

A draft revised development Contribution Scheme was brought to the members in November 2007. It has now been issued for public consultation. It is essential that this county has sufficient development contributions to continue necessary capital works. These works are vital in the context of the Draft County Development Plan 2009-2015 and the Development of the Midland Gateway.

Housing Maintenance

A review of our processes was initiated for managing housing maintenance. The review will take into consideration methodologies for tracking and dealing with housing maintenance requests and effective use of resources. In addition, the relative responsibility of Housing HQ and Areas is being reconsidered, as well as the option of dividing housing maintenance into two sub-programmes – (i) urgent/emergency and (ii) planned maintenance. The objective is to have consistent countywide approach to the service (including how we respond in the context of what is outlined to tenants in their handbook), and ensure, over time, that the planned maintenance programme reduces the need for urgent maintenance and pre-letting repairs.

We would like to take this opportunity to pay tribute to former Cathaoirleach Gerard Killally and to the elected members, management and staff – both indoor and outdoor, for their commitment, co-operation and support, in the delivery of the services of the Council during 2007.

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MOTOR TAXATION

ROADS

Goal: To provide for the safe and efficient movement of persons and goods by road.

Strategies:

Implementing a programme for the improvement and maintenance of the County's road network, including public lighting and signage.

Incorporating sustainable development considerations into our road policies.

Implementing a fair and efficient Local Improvement Scheme. Promoting Community Participation of roadworks schemes.

Strategic Policy Committee Meetings.

Four meetings of the Roads and Infrastructure Strategic Policy Committee took place in 2007. A policy document on road signage at schools was presented and approved by the Strategic Policy Committee in May 2007. The Elected Members at the July monthly meeting of Offaly County Council approved this policy. During the year other issues discussed at the SPC meetings were: -

- Canal Bridges
- Public lighting
- Review of Traffic Calming Policy
- Unauthorised vehicles on public roads.

Offaly county council is responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of 2,064 km of roadway in the County. The road network is broken down as follows:-

National Primary 19.76 km
National Secondary 120.91 km
Regional 346.13 km
Local 1,577.15 km

In 2007 Offaly County Council received a total allocation of €35,145,271 in respect of National and Non-National roads in the County. Of this €1,486,647 was financed from Offaly County Council's own funds with the remained coming from the Department of Environment, Heritage & Local Government and the National Roads Authority.

Local Improvement Schemes

This scheme allows for the improvement of roads not in charge of Offaly County Council which provide access to at least two parcels of land owned or occupied by different persons engaged in agricultural activities or for harvesting purposes. The allocation from the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government in 2007 was €418,140. This allowed, with the assistance of the CLAR allocation, for 19 schemes off the 2007 priority list of 71 to be completed.

Community Involvement in Roadworks Scheme

The Council is allowed to spend up to 7.5% of the total allocation for restoration maintenance/reconstruction roads on which there would be an input of resources from local communities. Local communities are

required to contribute a minimum of 25% either in money or in kind towards the project. The allocation of $\le 286,000$ ($\le 71,500$ per area) allowed Offaly County Council carry out a number of schemes in each area.

Health and Safety

Health and Safety in relation to roadworks was an ongoing issue in 2007. In order for Offaly to comply fully with current Health and Safety legislation, significant additional costs in the region of 10% to 15% onto the cost of roadworks schemes were encountered.

Road Safety

The inaugural meeting of the Road Traffic and Safety sub-committee was held in March 2007. The committee was set up under the auspices of the Joint Policing Committee.

The following specific road safety initiatives were undertaken in 2007.

Road safety art competition organised in conjunction with Tullamore/Edenderry Garda District. It involved twelve primary schools and over 80 children submitted entries.

Continuing to support Junior School Warden Scheme in five primary schools in the County.

Promoting a "Drive for Life Programme" in transition year students in secondary schools.

CLAR/DOEHLG - ROADS AND BRIDGES PROJECTS CO-FUND 2007

An allocation of €39,346 was received under this scheme in May 2007 for works on Local Secondary and Local Tertiary roads and bridges in Clar areas. Four road schemes were completed as follows:-

- Provision of serviced land to support residential development.

- Implement best practice in design, planning and management of water and wastewater services.

Water Quality:

The quality of drinking water remains of paramount importance. Continuous monitoring of public water schemes and group water schemes was carried out in order to ensure that the high quality of the water in the county is maintained. Monitoring was carried out in accordance with the European Communities (Drinking Water) Regulation, 2007 (S.I. 278 of 2007)).

Constant monitoring of public sewerage schemes was carried out in accordance with the requirements of Urban Wastewater Regulations and EPA requirements.

Well Grants/Domestic Water Supply

The Council assists households to provide a piped domestic water supply or to remedy deficiencies in an existing supply of water used for domestic purposes in houses, which are seven years old or over, up to a maximum of €2,031.58 or 75% of the cost of the works, whichever is the lesser. In 2007, 12 grants were paid out at a cost of €24,058.94.

HOUSING DEPARTMENT

Role of Department

The housing department plays a number of very important roles in terms of accommodation provision and enhancement for those unable to do so from their own resources. The department works to the specific objectives contained in our 5 year plan for Social and Affordable Housing 2004 - 2008 which is reviewed annually and targets adjusted in line with changing trends and demands.

The main activities within the department are the direct provision of social and affordable housing, facilitation of the voluntary housing sector, promotion of home ownership through housing loans and grants to individuals including those with special needs, implementing the Rental Accommodation Scheme as an alternative to social housing, providing a range of Traveller accommodation options, tackling homelessness issues and the promotion of estate management in local authority housing estates.

Social Housing

91 units of accommodation were made available for persons in need of housing in 2007 through a combination of our direct building programme, acquisition of Part V social units in private developments, the purchase of second hand units and the allocation of casual vacancies.



Affordable Housing

27 Part V affordable units were acquired during 2007 in private housing developments in Clara and Edenderry. 6 affordable houses and 10 serviced sites were also completed by the council during the year in Phase 1 of a development at Gallen, Ferbane. An affordable show house in the development was also open to the public over a number of weekends. These units represented very good value for money and sold at €135,000 for the basic unit and €145,000 for the show house.

Tenant Purchase Scheme

The Council's tenant purchase scheme offers local authority tenants an option to purchase their houses subject to certain criteria. Tenants of the local authority with certain exceptions can apply to purchase their house after one year's tenancy. Houses are purchased outright from the council at their market value with discount given for each year of tenancy subject to a maximum of 10 years. 21 houses were sold under this scheme during the year

Disabled Persons Grants

The disabled persons grant is available to eligible applicants to carry out improvements to their house to facilitate the needs of a family member with a disability. The council spent over ≤ 1.5 m in administering this scheme in 2007 and assisted 103 applicants.

Homelessness

The Council along with our neighbouring midland counties work closely with the Midland Simon Communities and provide funding towards the cost of employing Outreach Workers/Settlement Officers who specifically work with clients referred from the local authorities who are experiencing homelessness issues and finding it difficult to source accommodation themselves.

Estate Management in Local Authority Estates

A total sum of €5,400 was allocated to 11 Residents Associations under our grants scheme in 2007. Pre-tenancy training programmes were organised for all new tenants during the year.

The Housing Department in partnership with Tullamore Town Council, Tullamore Wider Options, Respond Housing Association and Offaly Outreach Education Project organised and funded a Fetac Level 5 Community Development and Leadership for Estate Management training programme during the year. 12 participants from all over the county completed the training.

Participants are pictured below receiving their certificates at a presentation ceremony in Clonamore on November 12th 2007. Some of the participants have since progressed onto third level degree programmes.



Rental Accommodation Scheme (RAS)

Offaly is one 8 local authorities that piloted this new government initiative which is aimed at ensuring security of tenure and better quality accommodation for long term rent recipients (i.e. generally those in receipt for 18 months or more). Over 60 tenants had signed up to the scheme in Offaly at the end of 2007.

Housing, Social & Cultural Strategic Policy Committee

This committee met five times during 2007 and recommendations were made on a number of policies during the year including:-

ARTS SERVICE

The Arts Service of Offaly County Council aims to be a facilitator and catalyst for the development of a vibrant arts environment in the county.

The Arts Service works under

Offaly County Council's 'Strategy for Economic, Social and Cultural Development 2002-2012', to 'facilitate the creativity, imagination, talent and traditions of all people in Offaly and the modes through which they are expressed"

And Offaly County Arts Plan 2007 to 2011: "to provide leadership in quality inclusive and innovative experiences of the arts for all and to demonstrate through best practice and partnership the benefits of increased access to and involvement in the arts for all our citizens."

Our main achievements in 2007 can be summarised as:

€2m Grant aid for Tullamore Arts Centre

An application was made to the Department of Arts Sports and Tourism under the ACCESS II capital programme and €2m grant aid was announced in April.

Offaly Arts Plan Published

Offaly County Council published its first Arts Plan in May which was launched by the Arts Council which was preceded by a joint meeting with the members of the Arts Council.

Dance Company establishes in Birr

In collaboration with Birr Theatre and Arts Centre we supported the establishment of the first professional artistic production company to locate in Offaly. Legitimate Bodies Dance Company aims to provide wide community access to dance as well as touring nationally and internationally with their own programme.

Music in Churches Series

We established a new **Music in Churches** series to promote high quality, classical, contemporary and world music in churches around the county.

Performances were by Juana Muzika (a Lithuanian Choir), the Bester Quartet (a Polish Jazz band) and 3epkano (Dublin classical ensemble) We also supported initiatives in 2007 that were actively pursuing the development of music in the county such as Tullamore International Summer Organ Series, Tullamore Gramophone Society and Tullamore School of Rock.

Hullabaloo Children's Arts Festival

In collaboration with Birr Theatre and Arts Centre we established Offaly's first Children's Arts festival in venues around Birr. The festival takes place in the autumn mid term break and was a resounding success with many workshops and productions sold out.

Arts in Health

Anam Beo the partnership Arts in Health programme with the HSE had two notable achievements:

- 1. Age and Opportunity selected two images from the exhibition for their national Billboard campaign for Bealtaine 2007 (Tullamore and Dublin)
- 2. Irish Rail funded the reproduction of 12 images from the exhibition for a long term display in Tullamore Train Station.

Support to Artists Scheme

25 artists received financial support under this scheme to assist them with materials purchase, exhibition costs or research time. Writer Geraldine O'Toole received the Tyrone Guthrie Bursary to spend two weeks at Annamacarrig and artists Peter McMorris and Louise O'Brien received first solo exhibitions in Aras an Chontae.

Drama Awards

11 drama groups and musical societies received funding for productions or equipment. Lisa Byrne (Birr Stage Guild), Jim Lawlor (Eden Drama Soc) and Claire Lynch (Banagher Drama Group) received bursaries to attend the Drama League of Ireland Summer School.

Festival Support

The Arts Office facilitated funding and advice to:

- The Shannonbridge Midsummer Music Festival
- Birr Vintage Week and Arts Festival,
- The Phoenix Festival,
- Slievebloom Storytelling Festival

Bealtaine, Festival of Arts for Older People

A county wide programme of events in May was coordinated and developed by the Arts Office including concerts by the Tullamore Gospel Choir, exhibitions, creative writing workshops, story telling and music.

Floating Theatre Company

In 2007 we established a funding partnership with Waterways Ireland to increase the number of schools which could be visited by the floating theatre company.

Scoil Mhuire B.N.S. Edenderry, Rhode N.S., Croghan N.S., Belmont, Highstreet N.S., Clonmacnoise N.S., and Banagher N.S. 360 students took part and approx 1000 people saw the performances.

Arts Act Grants

59 community groups received funding under this scheme to organise and participate in arts events. Funding amounts ranged from €300- €800.

Midlands Collaborative Projects (the Arts Offices of Offaly Westmeath Laois and Longford)

- Midlands Arts and Culture Magazine a 32 page magazine
 highlighting the diversity and quality of arts projects across the
 four counties and aims to create a greater cultural identity in the
 Midlands published as a free copy 3 times a year.
- A musician and residence project with 2 musicians working in the 9
 residential care settings in the Midlands, developed in conjunction
 with the HSE and Music Network.
- Kindermusic continues to develop in 9 centres as a music education programme for toddlers and parents, in conjunction with the VEC.

Young Novelists

Novelist Caroline Barry worked with a youth creative writing group (14 to 18 years) in Tullamore for a full year teaching them the skills of composition, character and plot development. The majority of the participants worked on writing novels and an anthology of novel excerpts called a **Murder of Crows** launched in December.

Film Commission

The working group continued to investigate how to attract further film production into the county and how to encourage a greater interest in film development within the county. The group was chaired by Cllr. Marcella Corcoran Kennedy and is made up of the Arts Officer, local film

professionals and others who have an interest in film development. A report was submitted in December 07.

Support and information service to professional, amateur, voluntary and community groups and individuals

The Arts Office is a resource for artists and arts organisations that require advice, direction and information on developing and promoting their arts practice. This element of the service is based on best practice principles in all forms of arts development and is intended to give rise to increased confidence in quality methods and professional approaches.

County Library & Archives

Access

Access to library services was enhanced with the extension of opening hours at Edenderry Library from 27 hours to 34.5 hours. This raised the number of opening hours per week at libraries countywide to 198.5 hours.

Libraries On-Line

Provision of public internet access via broadband was completed at all branch libraries. Internet usage increased 7% on the 2006 figure. There was also an increase in usage of other computer applications. These facilities are widely used by the immigrant population. With a network of 55 public internet points countywide, the County Library Service is well positioned to support delivery of on-line services including e-government.

Changing Libraries project

Back issues of newspapers are an important source for historical research. The Irish Times Digital Archive is a joint project between the Department of Environment, Heritage and Local Government, The Irish Times and An Chomhairle Leabharlanna. The archive is an exact reproduction of every edition of the newspaper from 1859 to 2007. This facility was successfully rolled out in all branch libraries in the county in 2007

Schools Library Service

The Department of Education and Science contributed over €41,000 for the purchase of stock for primary schools. The County Library Service's Schools Department provides library services to the 67 primary schools in the county. Online accounts were introduced in 2007 and each school was visited by library staff to demonstrate and promote this facility, whereby schools can monitor their own library accounts. Books are carefully selected by staff of the Schools Department to meet the needs of the individual school. Many teachers also visit the Schools Library Department where they are facilitated in making their own selection and are advised on the range of resources available.

Culture and Outreach Programmes

Staff of the County Library Service initiated, managed and participated in numerous cultural programmes. These events reached across all sectors of the community, with emphasis on outreach to young and old.

A comprehensive programme of author's visits was organised, with eight authors conducting 28 visits to over 900 children countywide. The visiting authors were Kate Thompson, Jon Berkeley, Tom McCaughren, Maeve Friel, Oisin McGann, Mary Arrigan, Ann Carroll and Aubrey Flegg. The programme proved very successful with teachers and pupils alike, and feedback included;

- " the pupils found it [authors visit] very interesting, informative and educational,"
- " they particularly liked excerpts from his books and the illustrations he drew."

Offaly County Library also participated in the annual Children's Book Festival programme. The promotion of the library service and of the Book Festival was aided by the purchase and distribution of specially designed promotional material. A countywide "Design a Bookmark" competition was held as part of the festival celebrations, and almost 1,000 entries were received. The winner in the 10 years and under category was Tara Flynn of Ferbane, and the winner in the 11 years and over category was Hilary Newcombe of Banagher. Each winner received €50 book tokens, and were presented with their prize at their local library.

Community & Enterprise

Based on the Strategic Objectives of the Corporate Plan

1. Providing civic leadership for Offaly and all its people, whatever their circumstances or backgrounds

1.1 Supporting Offaly County Development Board

In 2007 the County Development Board continued the implementation of its Action Plan 2006-2008. The CDB Steering Group and the full CDB met in March and October 2007. Community & Enterprise staff also provided induction sessions for new Board members.

C&E continued to support and facilitate the Interagency Sub Groups of the County Development Board to deliver the Priority Actions from its 3 year plan. The achievements of the Interagency Groups in 2007 are outlined under relevant headings below.

1.2 Comhairle na nÓg

Comhairle na nÓg met at County level in October to decide on the themes for the Dáil na nÓg. Facilitated workshops were held to discuss the themes. The Comhairle met again in November in Áras An Chontae. The young people met their Local Elected Representatives and posed questions to them on issues that concern young people in a debate chaired by the Cathaoirleach of Offaly County Council. Six delegates were elected to represent Offaly at the annual national Youth Parliament - Dáil na n'Óg in February 2008.

Community & Enterprise was awarded €13,980 under the Enhanced Programme for Comhairle na nÓg to expand their activities in 2007 and 2008.

1.3 Supporting the Community Forum to participate in policy development

Offaly Community Forum continued the implementation of the recommendations of the Community Forum Review 2006. The Community Forum Steering Group met on a monthly basis and representatives continued their roles on such bodies as the County Development Board, County Enterprise Board, Offaly LEADER+, the Heritage Forum, the Regional Drugs Task force and the Strategic Policy Committees of the County Council. The Forum also met regularly at electoral area level with the support of the Local Development Companies in the county and the Community & Enterprise Department.

The Community Forum launched its website www.offalycommunityforum.com



2. Maximising productive investment thereby facilitating the creation of good, sustainable jobs in the County

The Tourism IAG met 5 times in 2007. In December they completed the production of an Interagency Brochure highlighting the collaborative work on Tourism which is taking place in the County. The Brochure will be distributed to all households in Offaly in early 2008.



C&E continued to facilitate the Enterprise Inter-agency subgroup of the County Development Board and continued its participation and contributory funding to the Life Long Learning sub-group of Offaly County Development Board for the Offaly Outreach Education Project.

3. Making Offaly a pleasant, safe and enjoyable place to live and work

Sport

In 2007 the Offaly Local Sports Partnership continued the roll-out of its programmes including Buntus. In July the Sports Partnership held an International Games Festival which was the culmination of activities to promote the integration of minority communities into sporting organisations. This project was funded (€69K) by the Department of Justice Equality & Law Reform.

The Sports Partnership completed the development of its Strategic Plan 2008 - ?????? in December 2007.

Play

C&E facilitated and supported the Inter-agency subgroup of the CDB working on the development of a County Play Strategy. Community consultations were carried out by members of the group and individual consultations were held with member agencies regarding their role and possibilities around providing opportunities for play in the county.

C&E in association with the Sports Partnership, the County Childcare Committee and the Arts Office organised a County Play Day on the 3rd July which coincided with the International Games Festival. The event was held in the Tullamore Harriers and was attended by approximately 400 people. Events on the day included sporting activities, make-and-do, storytelling, puppets and bouncy castles among others.





Pride of Place

C&E facilitated 3 communities to participate in the National Pride of Place Competition. The communities were Rhode Parish Enterprise, Rhode; Churchview Heights & Greenwood Park, Edenderry and Tullamore Housing Association, Tullamore. C&E supported the projects in the preparation of

their presentations to the visiting judging panel and throughout the judging process in preparation for the National Awards event held in Westport, Co. Mayo in November 2008.

Smoke Alarm Project

C&E facilitated Offaly County Council's role as part of a Pilot Project to distribute smoke alarms to 250 homes in Offaly. Priority was given to older people/couples living alone in rural areas. The project was mainstreamed in 2007 and C&E continue to facilitate the installation of smoke alarms in another 250 homes in Offaly.

4. Building social cohesion and inclusion within and across the County C&E continued to participate in the Local Government Anti-Poverty

Learning Network to share learning and best practice.

C&E continued to facilitate and support the Offaly Social Inclusion Measures (SIM) Group and its sub-groups. Key achievements in 2007 were:

- The development of a Local Anti-Poverty Strategy for Offaly. Development of the Strategy included a strong consultation element with over 100 stakeholders. The Local Anti-Poverty Strategy was adopted by the CDB on the 24th October 2007.
- The Supporting Minority Communities Sub-Group met 6 times during 2007 and a number of activities were supported and funded by the group including: International Food Festival in Edenderry; translation of the Edenderry Community Directory into 3 languages; organisation of an information evening for migrant workers attended by 72 people; participation in the Midlands Community Interpretation Project; supported the establishment of a Migrant Workers Women's Group in Tullamore. These actions were supported by the funding of €5000 allocated from Westmeath Employment Pact for the actions of the Supporting Minority Communities Group.
- Continued support for the implementation of the Integrated Services to Travellers Programme funded by the Department of Justice, Equality & Law Reform. C&E are hosting the Traveller Information Officer Internship for a period of 1 year to implement the activities of the

Social Inclusion Working Group to change negative attitudes towards Travellers.

5. Developing and delivering quality services

Community & Enterprise supported the Local and Rural Development Cohesion Process throughout 2007 including administration of the funding (€207,500). This process aims to create a single over-arching structure for the delivery of local and rural development funding and services.

At the April meeting of the CDB the plans of the Local & Rural Development Organisations were presented as part of the annual Endorsement process. Submissions were compiled into a report forwarded to the Department of Environment Heritage and Local Government. Agencies from the other 3 pillars of the CDB also presented their plans as part of a widening of the process to include the presentation of plans by all agencies on the CDB.

6. Develop and promote effective internal and external communications strategies.

C&E continued to collate the information on the progress of the CDB Priority Actions and to produce quarterly progress reports.

The section collaborated with other sections within the Directorate on a regular basis through Directorate meetings. The Community and Enterprise team also participated in the Internal Customer Care plan exercise - 'Delivering Better Services' and supported the administration of this project.

7. Managing the Council to be a good and effective place in which to work

C.E organised Literacy Awareness training for staff in Offaly County Council in November 2007. The session was attended by 15 staff.

C&E in partnership with Tullamore Travellers Movement and the HSE supported the organisation of Traveller Cultural Awareness Training as part of the Integrated Services to Travellers Programme. This training

was open to all member agencies of the Integrated Services to Travellers Programme and was attended by 6 staff from Offaly County Council.

The aim of these training workshops is to increase awareness among staff of Offaly County Council of the barriers and issues people with literacy difficulties and from different cultural backgrounds face when accessing services.

C&E facilitated the development of an Internal Social Inclusion Plan and participated on the Equality Action Team.

C & E participated fully in the Performance Management Development System (PMDS) and PDPs were completed for all staff at the beginning of 2007. The 2008 TDP was completed at the end of 2007.

Staff in C&E participated in development and training opportunities including: Biodiversity, Agresso, Certificate in Local Government Studies, the Leadership in Local Government Programme and other relevant information seminars.

Planning Department

The Planning Department is responsible for land use policy, control of development including the protection of the natural built heritage and amenity of the County.

Land use policy is implemented by means of the County and Town Development Plans Local Area Plans, Village and Sraid Plans. Planning Control involves the process of planning applications up to 1,800 per annum, and the taking of appropriate enforcement action where necessary.

2007 was the first year of the Offaly Heritage Plan 2007 - 2011. This second heritage plan was launched in the spring and is a 5 year work programme. The delivery of the Plan is the primary driving force for the work programme of the heritage office. I would like to thank all members of the Heritage Forum, for their contributions over the year. The support of the Heritage Council towards the heritage officer post and the delivery of the Heritage Plan is very much appreciated.

The following is a summary of the main projects delivered in 2007. In addition, a considerable amount of time was spent on in house projects and liasing with communities and helping them plan, fund and deliver appropriate projects. 1. Launch of Offaly Heritage Plan 2007 - 2011

2. Castles

(a) Offaly Book

Surveying is very nearly complete.

Research and ordering of images is progressing.

Photography is 99% complete.

Six reconstruction drawings have been commissioned and drafts prepared.

DoE have agreed to fund 50% of the book.

(b) Scanning of Castles

The 3d laser scanning of Dungar, Ballymooney, Ballycowan, Monasterorois, Clonmacnoise, Esker and Ballinlough has been carried out by Gridpoint Solutions who are now processing the data.

3. Biodiversity Training

Woodrow Wildlife carried out the training of all council staff in October. All staff received training in one or more of the following:

Introduction to biodiversity, targeted technical training and training in ecological assessments.

4. Launch of the State of the Wild Report

Launch was held on Tuesday 8th May 2007 in Teach Lea with approx 60 in attendance. John Feehan launched the report it at the same time as launching the Offaly Naturalist Field Club. Both have been circulated widely since.

5. Biodiversity Summer School - Theme Plants and Insects

The summer school was held from Monday 2 July to Friday 6th July with 20 local participants. It was led by John Feehan with assistance from members of the Offaly Heritage Forum and Field Club members at no charge.

6. Survey of Bridges for Bats and Birds

Bridges were selected in Slieve Bloom area. Birdwatch Ireland carried out the survey of birds and Brian Keely carried out the bat survey. The report was submitted in October 2007.

7. Conservation Plan for Rahan Monastic Site

Howley Hayes Architects are undertaking this project. Caimin O'Brien has submitted the archaeological information. The Heritage Officer addressed the AGM of C of I Tullamore Parishes to update them on the project. Friday 4th May meetings were held on site with lead stakeholders. A public meeting was held on Monday 14th May - St Carthage's day, after an ecumenical service to report on progress made and to hear public's view. The final plan going to print 2008.

8. Oral History Recordings

This year the focus was on the industrial heritage with emphasis on Salts, Tullamore Dew and Goodbody's in Clara. Maurice O'Keeffe has undertaken the work. 72 hours have been recorded and edited. It will be launched Friday 31 August of Heritage Week 2007.

9. Support Community Groups Undertaking Projects

Environment Section

This Directorate is responsible for a diverse range of functions and services. The principal divisions within the Section are as follows:

- 1. Waste Management.
- 2. Litter Management.
- 3. Pollution Control and Water Quality Management.
- 4. Derelict Sites and Dangerous Buildings.
- 5. Health, Safety and Welfare at Work Act.
- 6. Veterinary Services.
- 7. Percolation Testing.
- 8. Burial Grounds.
- 9. Water Safety.

1. WASTE MANAGEMENT

As lead Authority for the implementation of the Midlands^[1] Regional Waste Management Plan 2005 - 2010, Offaly County Council co-ordinates all waste management practices in the Region.

The Plan sets out clear and ambitious targets including a new integrated approach to waste management over a 15 to 20 year period. Our future strategy is based on the waste hierarchy i.e. prevention, reuse, recycling and energy recovery ahead of over-reliance on landfill disposal. Our long-term targets for 2013 are to achieve rates for the combined household, commercial and industrial, and construction and demolition waste streams of:

Recycling 46% Energy recovery 37% Landfill disposal 17%

^[1] Laois, North Tipperary, Westmeath, Longford and Offaly County Councils

Other highlights of the Plan include:

- The provision of brown bins for household & business organic waste
- Minimisation of construction & demolition waste
- Examining the commercial viability and siting of a waste-toenergy plant for the Region
- Awareness information campaigns to reduce waste at home and at work.
- Increased investment in recycling initiatives e.g. Civic Amenity Facilities, Bring Banks and household dry recycling expansion

The Section processes Waste Collection Permit applications for the region. To date, a total of 566 have been received, 467 of which have been granted. It has responsibility for reviewing Annual Environmental Reports submitted in respect of "waste movements". The Section also co-ordinates waste enforcement in the region in conjunction with the EPA's Enforcement Network and plays a key role in implementing the various regulations.

Significant progress has been made in the following areas in 2007: -

- Derryclure Landfill: Waste is being deposited in the new extension costing in excess of €4m, completed in 2006. We have also completed the full Environmental Restoration and Capping of the old unlined landfill cell at Derryclure at a cost estimate of €5.5million.
- Civic Amenity Sites: We continue to ensure the operation of the facilities at Tullamore and Edenderry to best standards. An additional facility in Birr was completed in 2007.
- Recycling Bring Banks: A total of 47 bring banks are now in operation throughout the county.
- **Historical landfills:** The Council has compiled a list of historical landfills throughout the county. We now propose to carry out a risk assessment of each individual site to determine the most appropriate action required to deal with these sites.

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- Waste Enforcement: The Council has a team of nine people involved in Waste Enforcement, including four full time Litter Wardens. They provide an effective and visible presence to tackle illegal waste and litter activities, which involve the staff in operation on the ground and on patrol out-of-hours. In conjunction with the EPA Office of Environmental Enforcement and An Garda Siochána, a series of road checkpoints were arranged during 2007, to check on illegal waste movements.
- The Council administers the requisition of producers / distributors / retailers in respect of the free take-back of the End-of-Life Vehicles (ELVs) and Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment (the producer responsibility principle). The Council also issues Waste Permits for the provision of Authorised Treatment Facilities (ATFs) for processing the ELVs.
- Packaging Regulations: The Council continues to inspect major producers of Packaging Waste in order to assess compliance with the Packaging Regulations. One company has opted for self-registration with the Council. The remaining major producers are members of REPAK.

2. LITTER MANAGEMENT

Offaly County Council continued to implement its multi-faceted approach to tackling the problem of indiscriminate littering throughout the county. A combination of awareness, enforcement and other measures were adopted to promote behavioral changes among all sectors of the population towards littering and illegal dumping. The four Litter Wardens were actively engaged in enforcing the provisions of the Litter Pollution e.g., investigating litter complaints, abandoned vehicles, backyard burning, etc. In 2007, the Litter Wardens were assigned 121 complaints and all of these were resolved or closed off within this period. Council staff issued a total of 205 on-the-spot litter fines in 2007.

In 2007, the Council commenced the procedure of Statutory Review of its Litter Management Plan.

The Council's Environment Department has worked in tandem with the Areas to eliminate a number of black spot areas throughout the county.

3. POLLUTION CONTROL AND WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT

The Pollution Control Team is responsible for the implementation Environmental Legislation in the following areas: air, water, noise and nuisance. It also has a general water quality monitoring and management role. Specific activities undertaken by the section include the investigation of water pollution incidents, licensing of discharges to waters and sewers, licensing of significant emissions to air, monitoring of urban wastewater plants, rivers and lakes.

- Water Pollution and the Phosphorous Regulations, 1998: Water Pollution is a major concern in County Offaly. Therefore, much of the work of the Pollution Control Team is devoted to this matter. Only 37% of rivers in County Offaly are classed as unpolluted, compared to a national figure of 70%. In addition, the Tullamore, Philipstown and Figile Rivers are the most polluted rivers in the County in terms of Phosphorous loading. Under the Phosphorous Regulations, 1998 the Council is obliged to achieve a significant improvement in river water quality. To this end, the Council has established a team to undertake a comprehensive programme of Farm Inspections, Discharge Licensing and General Pollution Investigations.
- Water Framework Directive: The purpose of the directive is threefold:
 - 1. To maintain high status of water where it exists.
 - 2. To prevent any deterioration in the existing status of waters.
 - 3. To achieve at least good status of all waters by 2015.

Ireland has been divided into eight River Basin Districts (RBDs) covering the whole of the island of Ireland, in accordance with new EU and Irish Environmental Legislation. Offaly County Council is involved in three RBDs, The Eastern, The South Eastern and The Shannon RBD. The initial phase of the project will culminate with the production of a draft River Basin Management Plan for the districts in 2008.

Offaly County Council has implemented the designated monitoring programme agreed under the Water Framework Directive for all surface waters in its functional area. We participated in a number of public consultation forums on the implications of the directive.

4. DERELICT SITES AND DANGEROUS BUILDINGS

The Council continued to identify additional sites for entry on the Register, and owners have been directed to carry out the necessary works on derelict black spots.

5. HEALTH, SAFETY AND WELFARE AT WORK ACT

To meet our responsibilities in the area of Health, Safety and Welfare at Work, the Council employs a Health and Safety Officer to advise management and staff on all Health and Safety matters and to foster a Health and Safety culture throughout the organisation. The role includes:

- Review of the management of Health, Safety and Welfare issues within Offaly Local Authorities, both at corporate level and within each operating section.
- A review and update of Safety Statements for all Council premises.
- Safety Audits / Inspections.
- Participation in the NISO Safety and General Knowledge Quiz in the Midland Region.
- Participation in European Safety Week.

6. VETERINARY SERVICE

One of the main responsibilities of the Veterinary Department is the delivery of services in connection with the Council's role as an Agency of the Food Safety Authority of Ireland. In this regard, the Council's team of Veterinary Inspectors, to ensure compliance with food safety legislation and hygiene standards, supervises Low Throughput Abattoirs, Small Meat Manufacturing Premises and associated food vehicles in the county. Procedures and conditions governing the slaughtering of animals / animal welfare in licensed premises were monitored. During the year a total of 2304 cattle, 9651 sheep and 201 pigs were processed for human consumption in Low Throughput Abattoirs in County Offaly.

• Control of Dogs

The Council's Dog Warden Service is operated by the ISPCA, which also provides the Dog Warden. The Council provides the Dog Pound, the vehicle and the Veterinary Officer.

In 2007, the Council continued to concentrate on re-homing stray or unwanted dogs where possible.

Dog Control Kennels admitted 465 stray / unwanted dogs during the year. Of these, 49 dogs were reclaimed by their owners, 110 dogs were re-homed and the remainder were put to sleep.

Dog owners purchased a total of 2,127 individual Dog Licenses during the past year.

Control of Horses

The Council has no facility for impounding horses and avails of a service provided by Local Authority Services in Kilkenny. Under the Control of Horses Act, 1996, the Council seized / impounded 4 horses in 2007. Horses are only released in accordance with the Council's Control of Horses Bye-Laws and on payment of the fees due.

7. PERCOLATION TESTING

Percolation Testing of sites for houses in unsewered rural areas is carried out as a link to the Planning Process and also in conjunction with Pollution Control mentioned above.

The Environment Section carried out 708 Percolation Tests in 2007, this figure includes 78 re-visits to sites. Following approval by the Members in mid 2006, a dedicated team has now been appointed to deal with all percolation tests. As a result we are currently 'turning around' all applications within an average time span of three weeks.

8. BURIAL GROUNDS

As part of its 5-year plan for the provision of new burial grounds and the extension of existing cemeteries in the county, adopted by the members

of the Council in 2003, the Council completed the extension of cemeteries at The Island, Rahan and at Edenderry during 2007.

9. WATER SAFETY

• Swimming Pools

2007 saw the completion of the upgrading of the swimming pool in Birr at a total cost of $\[mathbb{e}\]2.27$ million, of which Offaly County Council is providing funding of $\[mathbb{e}\]2.80,000.00$. The Council made a submission to the Department of Tourism, Sport and Recreation in support of an application by Birr Swimming Pool Committee for funding of $\[mathbb{e}\]1.3$ million to refurbish the pool at Birr and the Department approved same in 2005. The Council also approved funding assistance in the sum of $\[mathbb{e}\]500,000$ for the new Tullamore Swimming Pool.

Environment Strategic Policy Committee (SPC) Meetings

The Environment Section held four SPC meetings in 2007.

During 2007, Offaly County Council supported, by way of advice and financial assistance totalling €125,000.00, environmental initiatives including: Environment Grants, Tidy Estates Competitions, Anti-Litter Grants, Green Schools, Local Agenda 21 Grants and Media Campaigns.

The above shows the incidents attended by Offaly's fire brigades in 2007. There was no increase in incidents compared to 2006. There have been signs of improvement in the historical problem of chimney fires, while it was static last year, there is a 10% drop for 2007. While road traffic accidents have become a significant part of brigade activity in recent years, there has been a 4% drop in 2007, (from 1 in 5 in 2006, to 1 in 7 in 2007).

While sadly, there were a number of fatalities and serious injuries as a result of road traffic accidents, there were no fatalities due to fire in 2007.

The Fire Service continues to work closely with the Ambulance (HSE) Service, and the Gardai in training and preparing for emergencies, and took a full part in a Major Emergency Management exercise at the airfield in Birr last May.

Capital Projects

Edenderry new fire station was completed in 2007, and has been in service since the second quarter of the year. A new appliance was also completed in 2007, and located in Edenderry. Edenderry has also put an emergency tender, mainly for road accidents, into service. The County has also appointed an Assistant Chief with particular responsibility for Major Emergency preparedness, and he is working with colleagues in the Midland counties in the development of a regional plan.

Fire Prevention

The Fire Service carries out inspections mainly under the Fire Services Act 1981 and 2003, and the Building Control Act 1990. They are also carried out under Planning Acts, Dance Halls Act 1935, Gaming and Lotteries Acts, Explosives Act (Fireworks Displays and Gun Licences), Dangerous Substances Act (Filling Stations), and Health Acts (Assemblies for plays and concerts).

Planning: In 2007, 346 premises (an 18% increase on last year) were inspected under planning legislation (including 15 for Birr Town Council and 52 for Tullamore Town Council). 132 Fire Safety Certificates were processed, a decrease of 14% on last year.

Fire Safety advice was given to schools, assembly managers and their staff. Industrial and commercial premises managers and staff were also assisted in setting up safety procedures. The Service also took advantage of the "seminars" held at the hand-over stage of local authority housing to deliver a fire safety message to new home owners. Community Activity Groups were met and safety advice given.

A total of thirty-five members qualified in the use of A.E.D.'s (Automated External Defibrillator) under the watchful eye of our four A.E.D. Instructors. The Civil Defence were involved in a large scale County exercise in June, this took place in Birr Airfield where a simulated Air crash took place. This exercise involved all the Leading Emergency agencies:- Gardai, Ambulance Service, Defence Forces .Dept of Environment: Civil Defence took a very active and lead role in providing two Ambulances, Fire Appliance, Radio Communications, Several First Aid teams and also carried out the Triage of the casualties involved in the Multi-Service Exercise. The scenario commenced in the early afternoon, and culminated in a search of the crash site, for the flight recorder and other item of interest, to the investigating team from the Air Accident Unit

Civil Defence responded to a "Stand-By" call from Ambulance Control during the Christmas period owing to icy road conditions, and provided two 4×4 Jeeps .We were stood down after forty eight hours. We are becoming more involved in the M.E.P. for the County, as our role increases in the ever changing area of Rescue, Emergency Service back up etc.

Our training classes continued apace during the year and five new volunteers joined the service, and they will complete their basic First Aid course by years end. Auxiliary Fire Service members completed their training also, with the presentation of certs by the Civil Defence Officer (C.D.O.).

Following a growing trend in Offaly Civil Defence, several members participated in the Annual Military Pilgrimage to Lourdes, and the team enjoyed and took part fully in all the ceremonies and parades etc. This is a way in which Offaly Civil Defence, can "Fly the Flag" as it were, and portray a very positive image indeed, while on service overseas.

2007 saw a very busy duty schedule, Civil Defence provided Ambulance cover, First Aid cover and various other logistical support, to the various events throughout Offaly. E.g.: Kilcormac Ramblers New Years Day walk: St.Patrick's Day festivities in Tullamore, Clara, Kilcormac. Birr Vintage Week

Tullamore Phoenix Festival, and perhaps the biggest event countrywide, Fleadh Cheoil na hEireann. Civil Defence members worked from early Friday afternoon, to late into Monday morning. I received quite an amount of praise afterwards, at the Fleadh de-brief in the Garda Station, thanking my team for their work commitment, and professional attitude to the duties, and dealing with the public.

In 2007 Offaly Civil Defence provided cover to a total of sixty one duties, plus assisting local schools, and special needs children in different projects.

It is my wish as the Civil Defence Officer, to assist our community in any way that our resources can allow. And we look forward to 2008 with the same enthusiasm and professional attitude, as we did in previous years.

Retirement of former County Manager - Niall Sweeney

Members and Staff united in paying tribute to Niall Sweeney at a function in the Tullamore Court Hotel on 26th January 2007 to mark the occasion of his retirement as County Manager of Offaly Local Authorities from 1997 to 2007. Niall, a native of Tullamore was educated at the local St. Columba's Christian Brothers School and subsequently at University College Dublin. Early on in his career he worked in the private sector, as a Consulting Engineer, before pursuing a career in Local Government. He worked in Laois and Offaly County Councils at Executive Engineer and Senior Executive Engineer levels. He was County Engineer in Clare for seven years prior to his appointment as Offaly County Manager in January 1997.

He has been a keen amateur artist and photographer for many years.



Human Resources Department

Offaly County Council recognises that its success in providing a high quality service to the community has been built on a loyal, dedicated and committed workforce. The Human Resources Department functions include staff recruitment and retention, workforce planning, staff welfare, staff leave, employee relations, industrial relations, training and development, performance management and workplace partnership.

The aim of the Department is to assist all Offaly Local Authorities in the delivery of organisational objectives, while at the same time developing the potential of every staff member.

Recruitment

The H.R. Department oversees the recruitment of employees in Offaly County Council and in the Town Councils of Birr, Edenderry and Tullamore. In 2007, 51 competitions were held to interview candidates to fill permanent and temporary vacancies in the authorities. Independent interview boards were selected to recommend the most suitable candidates for employment or promotion in accordance with national regulations.

Training

Performance Management Development Systems (PMDS) was introduced into the Local Authority sector in 2006. The principle of PMDS is to manage performance more effectively and to ensure that all members of staff have a systematic and verifiable personal development plan. PMDS is also a critical input into the organisation's business planning processes and promotes an inclusive approach to strategic planning. Many of the training needs identified through the Team Development Plans (TDP) and Personal Development Plans (PDP) were delivered during 2007. In excess of 150 training and development courses were delivered. Health and Safety training was prioritised and all training is developed and delivered

with customer care and service delivery at its core. Training for staff concentrates on:

- Customer Care and Service Delivery
- Job Specific Skills
- Organisational Requirements
- Personal Development

During 2007 the Council prepared its *Excellence Through People* application, which was submitted to FÁS. Formal assessment is awaited.

The Human Resources Section encouraged and assisted 37 employees to pursue further relevant third level education courses.

During 2007 Offaly County Council continued its operation of a Work Placement Scheme for students in schools and colleges with students being given the opportunity to work in various areas of the local authorities. This scheme benefits students by assisting them in achieving their course needs by gaining relevant work experience.

Staff Welfare

Offaly County Council recognises staff as its most important resource and continues to promote work/life balance initiatives through the provision of: Career Break Scheme; Work Sharing Scheme; Parental Leave Scheme; Term Time Leave Scheme; Flexitime.

During 2007 a large number of staff received training on a number of Council policies, e.g., Dignity at Work, Grievance and Disciplinary Policy.

The Council advertised for an Employee Assistance Programme and this will be advanced in 2008.

Local Workplace Partnership

In accordance with the National Agreement *Towards 2016* the Partnership Committee discussed and endorsed Action Plans and Progress Reports, which were submitted to the Performance Verification Group (PVG). Members of the Committee played an active role in the PVG Site Visit, which took place in June 2007.

Other areas of activity included: presentations to staff on the final Report on the Workplace Review; consultant interviews in respect of a corporate Employee Assistance Programme; launch of the General Operative Induction Programme; LANPAG Educational Grant Scheme 2007-2008; and LANPAG Apprenticeship Scheme.

Two meetings between the Management Team and Trade Union Officials were held to progress issues in accordance with the **Handling Significant**Change through

Information Systems

In 2007 Offaly Local Authorities Information Systems department progressed a number of significant strategic projects. Among these were the following:-

Strategic Planning for ICT

In 2007 an Information Systems Strategy for the period 2007-2010 was developed and published. This document outlines the strategic direction

for Offaly Local Authorities' Information Systems department up to the end of 2010. It can be downloaded from www.offaly.ie.

Broadband Technologies

Following a procurement exercise in the Autumn of 2006 broadband connectivity was established for four of our sites on the Tullamore MAN. This significant investment in our ICT infrastructure will enable us to provide better service delivery options to all our offices in Tullamore. We also used the MAN to establish broadband links to Central Government Networks

Extensive Advance Works have been completed on ducting for the Edenderry MAN. Final departmental approval is expected in 2008 to complete this project.

Telecommunications

As part of our strategic plan to standardise telecommunications systems across the organisation a new telephone system was implemented in the Town Hall at Edenderry. This continues a project begun in 2006 to standardise phone systems at Birr, Ferbane, Tullamore Town Council and Edenderry Town Hall. The project will be completed in 2008 with the Ferbane implementation.

Geographic Information Systems

During 2007 the PlanIGIS digital mapping application was implemented in the Planning department. This will be followed in 2008 by the introduction of e-mapping on www.offaly.ie.

Mobile Computing

Facilities using Citrix technology were expanded in 2007 to allow remote network connectivity for staff and as backup/contingency for the larger sub offices in the county. Approximately 40 staff now use mobile ICT facilities for some portions of their work.

Internet Services

The redeveloped <u>www.offaly.ie</u> was launched in 2007 and Content Management software was introduced to improve management and updating of the site.

Network Development

Following requirements specifications carried out in 2007 an off-site ICT Disaster Recovery facility was established in 2007. This facility allows for the secure backup of the Council's major corporate databases and has failover procedures which can be used in the event of a major problem or malfunction in the Main ICT Server Room. This site is a crucial element of the Council's Business Continuity capability.

Finance

Our Goals

To plan the strategic financial management of Offaly Local Authorities and deliver the services of the finance function in an efficient, effective and professional manner.

Our Strategies

 Develop accounting and management information systems that deliver the best possible basis for future planning, budgeting and decision making in order to maximise financial resources available.

- Promote and direct Value for Money concepts and foster a culture of effective use of resources.
- Prepare an annual financial budget that reflects our corporate objectives.
- Enhance the Financial Management System and in particular, the provision of more meaningful financial management information.
- Ensure prompt payment to suppliers.
- Promote a value for money culture in the organisation.

Our Services

The expenditure for 2008 for Offaly County Council will be approximately €130million between Revenue and Capital jobs.

The Finance Department deals with both the short and long term financing of all the Council's operations, both of a Revenue and Capital nature. This involves:

- Monitoring and controlling income and expenditure.
- Arranging borrowing/leasing requirements.
- Treasury Management.

The Department also ensures compliance with all statutory and financial accounting principles, which apply to all monies paid by or to the Council.

The Council's revenue and day-to-day expenditure is defrayed from sources such as:

- Commercial Rates:
- Local Government Fund:
- Government Grants;
- Housing Rents, Planning Fees, Commercial Water Charges and other Fees.

The Main Sections within Finance are:

Central Debt Collection and Revenue

Recovery of Commercial Rates, administration of Housing Loan accounts, debt collection and receipting of all monies due to the Council.

Accounts Payable

Registration of all suppliers invoices received and central processing of invoices. Completion of Purchase to Pay cycle with weekly cheque payment run.

Payroll

Payment of weekly wages and Fortnightly payment of salaries and pensions. Other periodic payments, to Firemen, etc. Statutory returns to Revenue Commissioners.

Fixed Asset Register

Recording and maintaining all fixed assets acquired (created or purchased) and disposed of throughout the year.

The Main Reports Produced by Finance are:

The Annual Budget

The Finance Department:

- prepares the overall Revenue Budget in consultation with the County Manager and the Management Team;
- presents it to the Corporate Policy Group;
- presents it to the Elected Members for adoption at the Annual Budget Meeting.

The Annual Financial Statement (AFS)

The AFS is produced annually and brings together all the revenue-related income and expenditure for the year, resulting in a surplus or deficit for the year. The Balance Sheet shows the assets and liabilities of the County Council at the end of 2007. A report on Income and Expenditure on Capital jobs is also prepared. Accounts are presented to members at Council Meeting and audited by the Local Government Auditor.


Monthly Management Reports




2007 Revenue Expenditure by Programme (€Million)




2007 Revenue Income Analysis (€Million)

Motor Taxation Office


The Council collects vehicle licence duties and issues driving licences (provisional, full and duplicate) within its functional area on behalf of the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government.

Motor taxation receipts for 2007 were €12.09 million, an increase of 2.7% on 2006.

During 2007 a total of 88,713 vehicle licences and 9,201 driving licences were issued. Other transactions, including change of ownership for pre-1993 vehicles, certificates of roadworthiness, vehicle registration certificates and processing vehicle licensing arrears totalled 13,530. The Section also produces information to Gardai and other Local Authorities, e.g. penalty points, traffic fines, parking fines, etc.

Electronic payment is available at the counter and through the postal applications.

An online vehicle taxation service is now available - 19.96% of motor tax transactions (excluding Driver Licenses) in Offaly were dealt with online in 2007.

Transaction costs per transaction = €6.09.

Lloyd Town Park.

In consultation with Local Community and sectoral interest groups Tullamore Town Council in partnership with Murray and Associates drafted a unique design for Lloyd Town Park. Funding was scoured from the Dept. of Arts Sport and Tourism and Internal Reserves. Part 8 Planning was granted by the members of the Town Council.

Skateboard Park.

In consultation with the Skateboard Action Group Tullamore Town Council successfully constructed a skateboard Park in Lloyd Town Park.

<u>Lawn Bowling Green:</u>

The Tullamore Lawn Bowling Green was identified as a key project from the consultations over the past two years. Tullamore Town Council has worked with a number of local groups in designing a facility for both competition and family use.

Youth Council:

Tullamore Youth Council conducted extensive research into youth needs and published "youth expectations" this was followed by the establishment of a working group for a youth café. They have now sourced €3,000 to conduct a feasibility study.

SERVICES PROVIDED

Housing and Building:

As at 31 December 2007 there are 187 rented houses in Birr together with a six bay residential caravan park at Croghan Road, Birr. Forty-six of these are Special Category (for Elderly or Disabled Persons).

The construction of 23 dwellings at Scurragh is near completion.

Road Transportation and Safety:

Birr Town Council is responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of approximately 10 km of urban roads and streets, including footpaths. Offaly County Council is responsible for the provision and maintenance of the National Secondary and Regional Routes through the town.

Development Incentives and Controls:

The Council's Development Plan sets out a framework for the physical development of the town to ensure that growth may take place in a coordinated and orderly manner, while at the same time conserving the intrinsic character and amenities of the town. The Council adopted the Development Plan for Birr and Environs 2004 on 31 May 2004.

The Council received 38 valid planning applications during 2006.

Environmental Protection:

Waste Disposal Facilities for County Offaly are located at Derryclure, Tullamore only. The domestic refuse collection service is operated by private contractors.

A Traffic/Litter Warden has been employed to deal with the enforcement of the provisions of the Litter Pollution Act.

Recreation and Amenity:

The Council maintains a considerable area of open space in Birr & manages the playground at Wilmer Road.

Welfare:

The Council funds the provision of school meals in conjunction with the Department of Social Welfare.

Edenderry Town Commissioners became known as Edenderry Town Council with effect from 1st January, 2002. Edenderry is the second largest town in Offaly and has experienced huge growth in the last five years. Edenderry Town Council is involved in a broad range of services.
