Planning Administration

The review process of Offaly County Council Draft Development Contribution Scheme 2021 – 2025 has commenced. Publication will commence a six-week submission process extending from 6th November to 18th December 2020 where submissions in writing can be accepted.

Forward Planning

The last date for receipt of submissions on the draft Offaly County Development Plan was 7th October 2020. 196 submissions were received. A Chief Executive report will be prepared on these by early January 2021 for the elected members' consideration.

REGENERATION

Rural Regeneration Development Fund: (**RRDF**)

Rural Regeneration Category 1 (Shovel ready) - Closing date of 1st December, 2020 for submission.

Town and Village Renewal Scheme

To date the Regeneration Team in conjunction with Municipals Districts and

other sections have submitted 18 projects in Rounds 1-3 of the TVR <u>accelerated</u> measures in response to Covid 19.

DRCD announced successful project from the final Round 3 as follows on the 12th October, 2020.

Tullamore - To refurbish Millennium Square to include a deep clean of the area, replace some paving and create an attractive urban seated/garden area providing an additional outdoor gathering space for Tullamore Town.

Daingean - Rejuvenation of Daingean Square, including deep clean, footpath resurfacing, urban seating and planters and the provision of additional seating in adjacent green amenity space to create safe, public gathering areas.

Clara - To enhance a river amenity in Clara by providing additional seating, resurfacing of stony pathways, improved entrance accessibility, landscaping and refurbishment of pedestrian bridge over the River Brosna.

Ferbane - The provision of a "*Chill & Chat*" pop up urban garden in the town centre of Ferbane where people can enjoy social interaction in a safe outdoor space while observing social distancing protocols.

Ballycumber - To enhance a river amenity area in Ballycumber by providing additional seating, upgrading of canopied seating area, improved entrance accessibility and repair of pathway to facilitate safe outdoor gatherings.

Geashill - To enhance 2 outdoor amenities in Geashill a picnic amenity area and the Glebe Walking Trail by providing additional seating and picnic tables and promote their use by providing heritage signage.



TVR scheme 2020

OCTOBER

Offaly County Council have submitted 10 applications to the standard Town and Village Renewal Scheme on the 30th September, 2020.

Outdoor Recreational Infrastructure Scheme: (ORIS)

The Department of Rural and Community Development announced a call for ORIS 2020 funding on 29th May 2020. Applications will be developed and prepared for Measure 2 and 3 by Regeneration Team in conjunction with other relevant sections for 30th November, 2020.

ROADS

Roads Programme 2020 is near completion throughout the County with the final grant claims in progress.

N80 Tullamore to Killeigh road surface improvement scheme is now complete;

The following works commenced in October and are currently ongoing:

- Collins Lane, Arden Way and Arden View Junction safety scheme;
- Bracknagh and Shannonbridge safety schemes;
- Offaly Grand Canal Greenway Ballycommon Bridge to Daingean and Wood-of-O Bridge to County Boundary;
- Edenderry Granary Court to Fairgreen Link Road;
- Upgrade of the Bus stop in Cloncollig Tullamore;
- Active travel and climate change adaptation measures in Offaly.

The Phase 2 Public Consultation for **N52 Tullamore to Kilbeggan Link Road** Scheme Route Corridor Options commenced on Friday 6th November 2020 to 11th November 2020. Information on the online consultation room is available on the website n52tullamoretokilbeggan.ie.

ENVIRONMENT AND WATER SERVICES

Water Services - Water

Works on the upgrade of the Tullamore, Birr and Clonaslee Water Treatment plants are on-going. IW are currently preparing the design for replacement reservoir at Clonbullogue and considering а replacement reservoir at Walsh Island. Leak repair: Find and fix works are ongoing Rhode, Tullamore, Newtown, in Edenderry. Watermain upgrades at Clonin and Newtown have been carried out with sizeable reductions in leaks.

Daingean Storm tank has been commissioned and the new Treatment Plant at Bracknagh has been up & running since 02-11-20. The Rahan Wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) is progressing well and should be commissioned in Q2 of 2021 at the latest.

Edenderry WWTP: There have been ongoing correspondences between Irish Water and Offaly County Council in relation to both the operation and maintenance of the existing wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) and the proposed upgrade of the WWTP. IW are preparing tender documents to appoint a Consultant to prepare a Feasibility Study Report.



Environment Environmental Complaints

OCTOBER

From the 1st January 2020 to the start of November, the Environment Section received 1252 complaints. These complaints cover the full range environmental issues such as litter, waste, noise, water quality etc.

All 1252 complaints have been investigated, with 849 closed and 403 cases are ongoing enforcement actions. This 403 figure includes litter fines to be issued as part of the Anti-Dumping Initiative.

The Environment Section assisted in 202 community clean-ups across the county, providing bags, pickers, gloves and removing materials collected. It should be noted that the 202 community clean-ups are addition to the complaints mentioned above.

Illegal Dumping

As part of the Anti-Dumping Initiative funding approved by the DCCAE earlier in the year, CCTV cameras were installed at a number of litter/dumping black spots throughout the County. Following on from this exercise, the Environment Section intend to issue 139 litter fines for fly tipping/dumping and 58 warning letters for more minor offences.

Flooding Relief Works

Flood relief to the Bog Road in Portarlington are nearing completion. This scheme was funded under the OPW Minor Flood Mitigation Works fund.

Tullamore Living River Project

The Tender process for this scheme is now complete and we await a decision on Leader funding. Subject to the grant of Leader funding, the project will commence in Spring 2021.

HOUSING

October Housing Update

• The return of applications and supporting documents for the 2020



Housing Need Assessment has closed and staff are currently reviewing all files and updating them as required.

OCTOBER

- There are 658 on the Housing Waiting List awaiting housing support at the end of September 2020.
- A further 850 active tenancies currently being supported under the Housing Assistance Payments (HAP) Scheme, 15 signed up for HAP and 16 exited from HAP in October 2020.
- At the end of October 2020 there were 19 single people and 5 families in emergency accommodation.
- 17 Rebuilding Ireland Home Loans applications were received in 2020 to date and 3 RIHL have been approved.

Housing Stock – Number, Maintenance & Repair

- Total housing stock at end of October, 2020 is 1,919.
- 2,831 maintenance call logged in 2020 to 30th October with 374 received in October.

Housing Capital Programme Update

- Raheen, Clara development (38 units) – received Stage 2 approval on 21st August 2020, and is progressing to planning.
- Church Street, Clara (3 OPD units) – received Stage 2 approval on 17th August 2020. Unfortunately, the vendor has withdrawn and the project cannot be progressed further at this time.

- Dargan Drive, Chancery Lane (20 Units) – received Stage 1 approval in March 2020. Staff are currently finalising the assessment of the consultant framework to allow the scheme to progress to planning.
- Moneygall (4 units) received Stage 2 approval in July 2020 and the members approved the Part 8 planning at the October Council meeting.
- Beechgrove Belmont (7 units) received Stage 2 approval in July 2020 and the Planning Part 8 is listed on the November Council meeting agenda for the members' consideration.
- Sr. Senan, Edenderry (4 Units) received Stage 2 approval in August 2020, and currently the scheme is at Part 8 public consultation stage.
- Banagher, Kylebeg (18 Units), a second stage 3 submission was made in April 2020. Stage 3 was approved by the DHPLG in May 2020 and the Tender documentation is being prepared and will issue soon.
- Circular Road, Daingean (9 units) -Stage 2 approval was received in December 2019 and the Part 8 planning resolution was approved by the members at the September Council meeting. The development is progressing to tender.

Approved Housing Bodies Schemes

- Mid Offaly Housing Association: Mountbolus, (4 Units) – completion due in November.
- Oaklee: Clonminch, Tullamore (19 units) - Tender Report almost



complete by AHB, Stage 4 submission to department made in October.

OCTOBER

- Oaklee: Kearney's Field (41 Units)
 Tendering process is complete and the project is to commence this year.
- Cluid Housing Association social housing scheme on the Rahan Rd (Jacksons Hill) (26 units) is scheduled to start in Q4 2020,
- Tuath: Killane Drive, Edenderry (27 units) completion due in Q1 2021.
- Sofia Housing: Stage 1 approved (32 units) at Presentation Lands, Portarlington. Stage 2 submission was made in October for a further 7 units.
- Sofia Housing, in a joint initiative with Midlands Simon Community, acquired Clonmore Hotel in Q3, 2020. The facility will be developed as an enhanced centre for the of supported provision for homeless accommodation Under the terms of a people. agreement Midlands landmark Simon Community will operate the facility, with a team of qualified social care workers providing support on a 24/7 basis. Following refurbishment, the facility will provide professional supports for up to 17 people.

Turnkey Developments

- Main Street Daingean (8 Units): Approved 13th August and works are scheduled to start in November 2020.
- MacGregol, Birr: 12 Units 6 units complete and a further 6 are progressing.

Retrofit Programme

The Council received notification on 8^{th} September that $\in 3.3m$ was being awarded to Offaly for the 'Just Transition for the Midlands Region' programme.

A surveyor has been appointed for first lot of 36 houses and it is anticipated that the initial surveys will be completed by mid-November. The information, gathered at survey stage, will allow contract documents to be prepared and for works to be tendered prior to Christmas. It is envisaged that a contractor will be appointed in the new year for these units. Further discussions with tenants to outline the works involved prior to the commencement of these works in early 2021.

The consultants will determine the works that will be required, works may include the following:

- Replacement of the heating system to a new technology heating system called a "Heat Pump"
- New radiators
- Attic insulation top up
- External or internal wall insulation
- Window Replacement
- New Doors
- Improved Ventilation

The Council has advised SEAI of the locations of these units for retrofitting and SEAI will now engage with private properties located near these dwellings to offer similar works under their existing home energy grant schemes.

LOCAL & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Offaly Covid-19 Community Response Helpline

The Helpline continues to operate from 9.00am to 5.00pm, 7 days per week. The



change to Covid Level 3 in Offaly on 6th October and the move to Covid Level 5 on 21st October did not result in an upsurge in the number of calls to the Offaly County Council Community Call Helpline. It appears that most people have supports already in place. A monthly breakdown of calls to the Helpline to date is given below.

Offaly Community Response Forum

There have been 14 meetings of the Offaly Community Response Forum to date. In October meetings were held on the 8th October and the 30th October and members were updated on support services being provided.

The members of the Forum are Offaly County Council, HSE, GAA, OLDC, An Garda Síochána, ALONE, SVP, An POST, Offaly PPN, Local Link, Citizens Information Service, Túsla, IFA, Offaly Traveller Movement, Kildare Volunteer Centre (covering Offaly), Civil Defence, Offaly Library Service, Family Resource Centres, and Offaly Community Services.

Local Community Development Committee (LCDC)

Offaly LCDC held their monthly meeting on Thursday 15th October with some members in the Council Chamber and the remainder attending by video link. Agenda items included the Rural Development LEADER Programme 2014 – 2020; Social Inclusion & Community Activation Programme (SICAP) 2018-2022 and an update on the Community Enhancement Programme 2020.

Members approved the proposed Local Development Strategy(LDS) budget revisions. There was no change to the overall budget allocation, the revisions involved the movement of funds between sub-themes. Under the Rural Development LEADER Programme, 7 Projects were approved and the total amount of funding awarded was €175,130.06.

Guidelines on flexibility in relation to the Social Inclusion Community Activation Programme (SICAP) Key Performance Indicator Targets for 2020 were received from POBAL due to the impact of COVID-19 and restrictions on the programme. The members approved the revised target in respect of KPI 2 – Goal 2: Working with Individuals to 500 individuals in respect of 2020. Members also agreed to the proposal to establish the Community Response Forum as a sub-committee of the LCDC.

Age Friendly Strategy

Work continues on the production of the Age friendly Tri County Radio programme which will air each Sunday morning from 8am – 9am on Midlands 103 commencing on November 1st. A subcommittee chaired by the Regional Age Friendly Manager Brian Pey has met weekly over the past month to coordinate this piece of work.





This group includes members of the OPC from all three counties and the Age Friendly Managers also. A Competition was held via the PPN in Laois Offaly & Westmeath to come up with a name for the programme. The winning name was 'Chatters & Matters'. Age friendly Alliance members continue to support the 'Connecting the Faithful' Newsletter with Issue 6 gone to print.

Public Participation Network

OCTOBER



The PPN are working with the Environment section in setting up workshops on Climate Change. Green Offaly as part of the Environmental wing of the PPN have been successfully in harnessing Just transitions funding. This is a follow on from the initial Leader funding projects.

The PPN are currently arranging to hold their Plenary in a different format this year. It will be run via Zoom by Municipal District to engage as many members as possible in these challenging times. The focus is on supporting groups with presentations on Committee role and Managing Communication and Fundraising during Covid.

Comhairle na nÓg

Offaly Comhairle na nÓg took part in the CYPSC Participation Consultation on the 28/10/20 with some valuable insights added to the previous year's document 'Summary of Laois and Offaly Children and Youth Participation Consultation 2019'. It's an important document which listens to the views and opinions of children and young people in their space. A Comhairle meeting was held on the 21st of October and the Executive created a survey which will be sent to all the schools in order to decide what topics are most important to young people for discussion at the AGM.

Music Generation Offaly Westmeath Chambers Ireland Excellence in Local Government Awards 2020

We were delighted to find out that Offaly County Council has been shortlisted for the Chambers Ireland Excellence in Local Government Awards 2020, for its role in Music Generation Offaly/Westmeath in recognition of our work in sustaining the arts. The Excellence in Local Government Awards 2020 (ELG Awards), sponsored by the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government, recognise and celebrate outstanding work being carried out by local authorities all over Ireland. This year's awards ceremony will be held online and hosted by Mary Kennedy at 3:30pm on Thursday, 26 November.

Autumn Voices 2020

Autumn Voices took place during the midterm break. Working in partnership with Music Generation Louth and Sing Ireland we spent 2 days working with around 40 young singers aged from 12 up. Activities included singing, song writing, rapping and we even found time for a pet show.





Mini Music Makers Session

UCTOBER

Our Music Educators Catriona Walsh and Ailbhe Kelly are running mini music sessions in conjunction with the library service. The sessions involve a combination of songs, music games, story time, rhymes and a singalong with and attract attendance from home-based toddlers and pre-school aged children, alongside groups of children attending preschools and crèches. Initially envisaged as a 7 week project we intend to develop the project further next year.

Sinfonia

Our Orchestral Residency developed in partnership with Maynooth University is back running weekly sessions online.

Music Jam

In early October Music Jam had made a welcome return to face to face tuition with a small number of participants, but due to level 5 Covid restrictions being implemented, we are now meeting on zoom. This will continue for the moment until it is safe to return to the face to face sessions again.

Music Production Autumn Course

Following on from the success of our summer course, we are running advanced Music Production and held our first session on the 8th of October. We have a group of 8 young people working with local musician Graham Dowling to learn the skills behind music production and develop their own compositions.

Athlone Youth Orchestra

We are busy working behind the scenes to develop a plan to get Athlone Youth Orchestra back in action.

Arts Office

Arts Grants

We have been continually assessing the arts act grants, professional artist support grants and festival grants, with a view to aid community groups and artists find alternative means of engagement if their original proposal could not take place. The latest update is that several Arts Act Grants and Festivals are now on course for delivery. The deadline for draw-down of funding is November

FilmOffaly – **Screen Ireland Application** FilmOffaly has been working to draw together a Midlands Film consortium comprising Kildare, Westmeath, Laois County Councils, LOETB, LEO, Midland Film Producers Network, with the purpose of submitting a bid to Screen Ireland for developing a New Talent Development Agency for the Midlands region to be led by FilmOffaly. This bid has been submitted.

FilmOffaly Mentoring Programme

FilmOffaly mentor Helen Flanagan has continued to be engaged and is working with 4 writers selected for the programme. Film Professionals Helen Flanagan and Alan Fitzpatrick have been delivering a series of online workshops in September for film professionals in Offaly. This programme is in collaboration with LOETB, LEO and Screen Skills Ireland.

Culture Night

The audience figures for the online culture night activities show that from the 14 programmed events, we achieved 25.9K reach and over 12K video views.



Hullabaloo!

OCTOBER

The Arts Office Hullabaloo! Children's Arts Festival was successfully held online during the Halloween break of October. Due to the current restrictions the programme has had to go fully online which did take additional time and resources to undertake. However, there was a very full programme on online events for the week of the festival including 12 zoom workshops, 25 pre-recorded workshops, 6 online shows. So far audience figures show that we received 25k social media reach and over 3k video workshop views.

Anam Beo

The Arts Office are one of the partners for an Arts Council funded award through their 'Invitation to Collaborate '

The lead partner in this project is Laois County Council Arts Office. The project is a regional project titled Mapping Arts Provision in Health Settings. Partner organizations are Laois County, County, Westmeath County Council, Offaly County Council, Music Generation OW, Anam Beo, Helium Arts, Waterford Healing Arts Trust (WHAT). Selection for the researcher has taken place and research has now commenced.

Public Art



Jessica Traynor who was awarded the Banagher Public Art Literature Commission

continues to develop links within the community to develop her oral history recording project, schools' writing and choral workshops, mentorship opportunities for local writers and events in conjunction with the That Beats Banagher Festival.

Jessica has recently been in contact with Banagher College. Musician Elaine Agnew will be arranging some online workshops and recording between herself and the students. The plan is for Elaine to set the poetry that Jessica worked on with her TY workshops, earlier this year to music, and that the students will record the piece remotely with Elaine guidance and facilitation. The resulting song will be released around Christmas over social media as a celebration of Banagher - and to celebrate getting through a difficult year!

Lough Boora

- The Deep Mapping project has been printed and was launched on Culture Night
- The Arts Office was invited to present the Deep Mapping Project at Creative Ireland's online conference titled 'Creating Deeper Engagement on Climate Change'. Lough Boora Sculpture Park featured as a case study model of best practice and the Arts Office took part in a discussion group on ways of engaging the public on climate action through creativity.
- ITC Art in Landscape Research Project – Collaboration with Mayo County Council and Visual Arts Ireland. The researcher Terre Duffy is continuing consultation with all stakeholders for the project.
- The Arts Office have submitted an application for continuation funding from the ITC Arts Council funds to bring in a curator and organise an



online conference in 2021 with existing partners Mayo County Council and VAI on Culture Environment and Tourism

OCTOBER

Platform 31

Platform 31 is the nationwide artist development scheme being piloted by ALAOO (Association of Local Authority Arts Officers) in collaboration with the Arts Council. This national opportunity is for artists to develop their practice and test new ideas of collaboration, research, audiencedevelopment, place-making and sharing their work, each county will put out a call for artists to apply through a selection process, and each county will select a local artist for the scheme. The press release for this project will be available in November.

Creative Edenderry

The development of the Creative Edenderry network is progressing well with regular meetings taking place with a cohort of interested people. The Group are continuing to progress an Arts project, looking at the theme of Our Place, with a focus on industrial heritage – the project is titled Shoes of Edenderry and includes curating stories, images, anecdotes from locals around the old shoe factory. A walking exhibtion in shop fronts was launched as part of Culture Night, and the project will be developed further with a planned series of events to take place in April 2021 under the Galway 2020 collaboration project. The artist Michael Fortune has been engaged to work with the group towards the delivery of an activity in April.

Birr Writer's Retreat

Four candidates were awarded the residency and these were planned to take place before end 2020, but this has been dependent on Covid restricition and it is possible that these residencies will now take place in 2021

Creative Ireland

The Arts Office continue to lead on a number of Creative Ireland projects including: Creative Edenderry, Community Open Call projects, Animation Residency and the Tullamore Arts Development Project. The finalisation of these projects has been taking place with Creative Ireland during October.

Online Communication Strategy.

We continue to engage the public and artists through our online and social platforms, Facebook, twitter and our extensive email



distribution databases, some topics covered in May include:

- Offaly Artists encouraged to share their work to Offaly Arts Visual & Music
- Promotion of online festivals i.e. Tullamore International Summer Organ Series, Birr Vintage Week and Arts Festival.

The Local Enterprise Office Offaly team continues to work remotely and provides a full service to new and existing enterprises in Offaly. The LEO team are providing much needed assistance to deal with the unprecedented numbers of business owners contacting the Local Enterprise Office. As we enter Level 5 restrictions, The LEO Office will continue to provide all our services remotely including mentoring, training courses and financial supports.

National Women's Enterprise Day

The National Women Enterprise Day Event took place Online on Wednesday 14th October 2020. The theme of this year's Women's Enterprise Day was "We're stronger together". Over 2,000 owners, managers and entrepreneurs around the country joined the online events. The LEO National Event is chaired by Orla Martin, LEO Offaly. The interactive events moved online to due to the Covid Crisis. The main themes for this year were resilience, selfcare, innovation and opportunity. All events were free of charge and include workshops with experts, panel discussions, a virtual marketplace and facilitated networking to connect more entrepreneurs with each other.

Upcoming Events and New Initiatives COVID-19 Micro-Enterprise Assistance

This grant is a contribution towards the cost of re-opening or keeping a business operational and re-connecting with employees and customers. Grants of a minimum of \notin 500 to a maximum \notin 1,000 in respect of vouched expenditure. This is a restricted scheme with only one grant available per business.





This fund is open to operating businesses who have suffered a 30% reduction in turnover due to COVID-19 restrictions or downturn in trade provided they commit to remaining open and to hiring and sustaining employment; Employed between 2 and 10 full-time employees (or full-time equivalents) on their payroll at the 29th February 2020 and have an annual turnover of less than €2 million as per the latest set of annual accounts. Businesses are not eligible for the COVID-19 Restart/Restart Plus Grant or similar COVID-19 business restart grants from other government departments. Applications must be submitted via www.microenterpriseassistance.ie. Closing date has been extended to 13 November 2020.

Irish Business Design Challenge

The Irish Business Design Challenge is a competition with a prize fund of \notin 50,000. The Irish Business Design Challenge will profile Ireland's 'hero businesses' over a number of weeks. 'Hero businesses' are those businesses that excel in coming up with innovative, smart, useful and relevant ideas or solutions, and which have a demonstrable impact and benefit on business, society or wider community. This might include environment, sustainability, diversity & inclusion, mental health and more.

Under the scheme a qualifying business may apply for funding to a maximum value of $\in 2,500$. Following approval of their application, a successful applicant can engage suppliers

and upon completion of the work, submit a request for payment to the LEO in line with the terms and conditions of their voucher. One to one mentoring and information seminars are available online. The application process for the vouchers will be a competitive process.

LEO Feasibility Grant Call

Feasibility grant towards prototype development & research available - Next closing date 31st December 2020. Feasibility/Innovation Grants are designed to assist the promoter with researching market demand for a new product or service and examining its sustainability. It includes assistance with innovation including specific consultancy requirements, private specialists, design, and prototype development.

GradStart scheme now available for LEO clients

The GradStart scheme is a 24-month graduate placement programme with funding of up to \notin 30k (\notin 15k per year). Local Enterprise Office client companies with at least 5 full time staff can apply for the GradStart programme.



The objective of GradStart is to assist indigenous companies to scale and grow their businesses through the introduction of good graduate talent (with a minimum Level 6-degree qualification) to deliver clearly defined projects.

Microfinance Ireland loans

UCTOBER

The COVID-19 Business Loan from Microfinance Ireland is a government initiative to support small businesses with less than 10 employees through the current period of uncertainty and protect job creation or sustainment in Ireland. The loan scheme has been revised and relaunched. Loans are from $\notin 5,000 - \notin 25,000$ up to 3 years. First 6 months – 0% Interest & Zero repayments. Reduced interest rate 4.5% APR for LEO applications.

Prepare for Brexit – Information for Businesses

For any businesses dealing with UK companies, there may be issues with continuity of supply post December 31st 2020. In particular payment of UK VAT on purchases will be demanded and this cost will not be recoverable. In addition, customs duties will be payable on most products.

Eight practical measures that businesses on the island of Ireland should adopt now:

- 1. Register online with HMRC or Revenue for an EORI number – you cannot trade without one.
- 2. Contact your suppliers and logistics providers about the continuity of goods and services you need for trade.
- 3. Check if your non-UK suppliers use the UK as a land-bridge and

ascertain whether this will cost and cause delays.

- 4. Classify the goods that you import or export for customs duties and know their origin.
- 5. Seek out a customs agent or enhance in house customs knowledge.
- 6. Ensure that you have a line of credit to deal with the customs duties that will arise on imports from the UK or Ireland.
- 7. Check whether your current certifications, licences or authorisations will be valid post-Brexit.
- 8. Use the Local Enterprise Offices and other Irish Government supports available.

The Local Enterprise Office Offaly also recommends that all businesses take the Brexit Scorecard first. This will analyse your business and outline the key areas of concern in the event of a hard Brexit.

1.InterTrade Ireland Start to Plan Voucher Scheme

InterTrade Ireland offers 100% financial support up to €2250 (inclusive of VAT) towards professional advice in relation to Brexit matters. This support can help your business get advice on specific issues such as movement of labour, goods, services and currency management. For more information visit:

2.SBCI Brexit Loan Scheme

The Brexit Loan Scheme can provide affordable financing to businesses that are impacted by Brexit. The Scheme is OCTOBER 2020

delivered by the Strategic Banking Corporation of Ireland (SBCI) through commercial lenders and will make €300 million available to eligible businesses with up to 499 employees at an interest rate of 4% or less. BROADBAND / DIGITAL

DojoMór

Nationwide, online, coding fun-day for young people aged 7 to 17. Offaly County Council was involved with 8 third level colleges as part of this online event and nationally we had over 9,500 attendees taking part with over 700 from Offaly. This

event showed students how to create a simple game, build a website, programme electronics, create music and develop 3D models using computer coding techniques. Greatly inspired by CoderDojo, this event was an amazing opportunity for young people to be exposed to and to learn practical and valuable skills, that they will take with them for life. Offaly was the only Local Authority involved and this is building on existing links with Trinity for iLofar and Cork Institute of Technology for VEX Robotics. Colleges involved were: Tralee Institute of Technology, Cork Institute of Technology, Dundalk Institute of Technology, Waterford Institute of Technology, Galway-Mayo Institute of Technology, Dún Laoghaire Institute of Art, Design and Technology, Letterkenny Institute of Technology and Maynooth University.

STEM Programme in schools

This month we start the programme in the primary and post primary schools in Offaly. This programme is needed to ensure today's students are qualified for the jobs of tomorrow. This programme is an ideal introduction to students who we hope will drive Offaly's economic ambitions, support innovation and provide the foundations for future prosperity in the county. OCC and OLDC have provided funding to rollout the post primary programme to all secondary schools in Offaly. We currently have 30 schools involved in the primary school programme and we currently have funding application in under Just Transition Fund(JTF) for "Building Resilience & Adaptability in Primary School children through STEM in communities impacted by decarbonisation"to further increase the OCTOBER 2020

number of primary schools talking part in the 2020/2021 school year. This STEM VEX programme is delivered by Offaly County Council in partnership with CIT Technology), of (Cork Institute DRCD(Department Rural of and Community Development), OLDC(Offaly Development Local Company), LEO(Offaly Local Enterprise Office), Offaly Libraries, Broadband Officer and OCC ICT Department.

Live Church Services

We have assisted numerous churches and parishes over the last few months to get online. Church services help bridge the digital divide and helps connect seniors and communities to technology. This is also helping communities feel more connected during Covid restrictions.

Broadband Providers

With regard to fibre connections in towns we have worked directly in recent weeks with Virgin Media to address the connection gaps in Portarlington, and with Eir in Shannonbridge. Relevant civil works have been undertaken and the connections for domestic and business locations are now available.

National Broadband Ireland

Offaly County Council are continuing to keep in contact with National Broadband Ireland with relation to surveys in Offaly in preparation for National Broadband Plan fibre rollout.

Connecting Communities:

Broadband Community Points (BCP) Ballycommon TTC is one of the national pilot sites for BCP rollout and is still being tested. Three further sites are now also fully

connected, at Kilclonfert Community Hall and Croghan Community Hall also in the Edenderry Municipal District while the Rosfaraghan Business Park near Ferbane Primo premises is also connected. Offaly County Council are awaiting formal handover of these BCP sites from the Dept. team, for the community venues to commence local operations. Other BCP sites in the county are on the November installation list for the backhaul BCP connection, and where that is in place already some further sites are in line for the Vodafone connection which will provide actual service to the venues. Offaly County Council have listed some further BCP opportunities with the Dept. for consideration for connection. A low key national launch of the BCP sites took place on Friday 16th October in Kerry and Offaly will organise local launches in due course. Town & Village Renewal Scheme funding for "Fit out of Broadband Connection Points" in the amount of €40,000 has been received and is supported by matching funding of €5,000 from Offaly County Council.

WiFi4EU

Installation at sites is proceeding in partnership with community and business locations in Offaly. The Tullamore WiFi4EU project was launched on 8th October as a lead in to the Tullamore Municipal District meeting that day.

The Birr sites are being worked on and the Edenderry sites are in preparation. A fourth list of remaining sites will be connected in due course. As a result of the Tullamore WiFi4EU launch the EU Commission has identified this project as the first in Ireland



progressing to full installation and has invited Offaly County Council to submit a project review for their use at European Commission's WiFi4EU website and beyond.

UCTOBER



E-denderry Digital Smart Town pilot project This is progressing well with the recent installation of the first LoRa (Low Range radio) gateways in the country, and air quality monitors provided by Cellnex our technical partners in the project in late Sept; in collaboration with work the project is doing with the EPA air quality monitoring programme to evaluate how such stations can use new Internet of Things technology which communicates over LoRa. By the end of October designated car parking spaces sensors were installed in Electric Vehicle parking bays, wheelchair spaces and loading bays and next week some bin sensors are being installed. All of these systems are being piloted as IT comms opportunities to help test the Cellnex SmartBrain data management interface and the systems will be evaluated for their benefits to town management. Other sensors systems are also being looked as to use for wider projects in the town using IoT, LoRa and Smartbrain. It is hoped to formally launch this project at the Edenderry MD meeting of 9th December. partnership will help position This Edenderry as an innovative and forward

thinking location at national level. Other similar projects are ongoing in SmartSandyford, Digital Limerick and SmartDublin. Offaly wishes to position itself at that level and Edenderry has been an ideal location in which to develop the project to date due to staff buy in and support and other factors including the major support from Cellnex on this project to date.
